

so the couple opted to extend their stay through April at the urging of friends who told them "don't come back home."

The couple have two daughters and six grandchildren, including Katherine and Kevin Curran of Albany, N.Y., and Amy and Jason Bonesteel of Dawsonville, Ga.

The couple became small business owners after retiring (Mel in the paper industry and Leanna as a chiropractic assistant) and will reopen them in late spring.

Q. Can you tell us about your the businesses.

In 1995 we brought an old farm with 56 acres on a tourist route into the Adirondacks to open an antique shop called Antiques by the Lake so we moved 18 miles to Harrisville from Carthage.

In 1997 we were offered a beeswax candle business. We had been selling them in our store because they went well with antiques. We called the new business Bonaparte Candle Co. after Lake Bonaparte which is located close to us. After a year we added scented jar candles, votives, pillars, t-lights,

tarts and candle accessories. The business grew and we started doing candle parties and selling wholesale to other stores around the country.

In 2009 we had the opportunity to open a wine & liquor

store because the one near us was closing. We named this business Bonaparte Wine & Spirits and located it in an 1800's barn located on our property.

Q. How did you discover the Alabama Gulf Coast and how many visits did you make before this year?

Part of the family had relocated here and we have been visiting here for 20 years.

Q. What led you to make the plunge into becoming actual Snowbirds this year?

We had been thinking of selling our property and businesses and retiring but decided that we love where we live and doing what we do. What we really didn't like was the long winters. It was decided to take the business's seasonal and spend the winters in Alabama.

Q. How did you find the Staybridge Suites and why did you choose to stay there?

We chose Staybridge Suites because we have two cats. Most rentals do not take pets especially cats. Leanna googled pet-friendly hotels and Staybridge came up. It looked like a nice place, close to the beach and everything else, we called for rates and here we are.

Q. Tell us a little about the atmosphere and activities there at the Staybridge Suites

The management and staff are excellent and strive to make you feel like this is your home. They take great strides to maintain the cleanliness and maintenance of the property. They provide a daily breakfast every morning and a meet and greet dinner Monday through Thursday. We meet people every day and have become good friends with a lot of them. There are a lot of folks who winter here every year.

Q. How often do you keep in touch with folks at home?

We keep in touch with friends a couple of times a week at home giving them our condolences about the weather.

Q. When you worked on your budget did you figure in the cost of running the utilities at your home and business had you stayed there this winter into your overall budget?

In planning our budget we looked at using less fuel by keeping our heat at a minimum temperature suspend our cable,internet,phone,no trash service and less plowing of the driveway. Our light bill has been cut in half. Our vehicle gas costs less in Alabama. But most important we are actually warm, something you never are back home.

Q. What will keep you coming back to the Alabama coast?

We will keep coming back because we have family here, the dining, beaches, friendly people and being close to everything. We would recommend that everyone back home get away from the harsh winter and enjoy the southern hospitality.

Q. Would you recommend the Alabama coast to others?

Yes, Alabama has a beach 30 some miles of sugar white sand better known around here as paradise.



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



The name Buffett is synonymous with the Gulf Coast.

Restaurants dot the coast. But his younger sister, Lucy, is a well-known name in her

Q. What is unique about this particular location in Destin?



While studying the history of architecture is essential to preservation and restoration, it also enables us to understand the society and culture the architecture represents.

Come appreciate some of Mobile's grand historic homes and learn how to recognize various architectural styles including Colonial Revival, Spanish Colonial Revival, Greek Revival, Italianate and Gothic Revival. Presented by the Historic Mobile Preservation Society, the Mobile Historic Homes Tour is 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday and Saturday, March 13-14.

"The Mobile Historic Homes Tour is a landmark event, going on its 46th year, that offers visitors an intimate look into the history and architecture of historic homes that are not open to the public," says Erica McElhaney, president of the board of directors for the Historic Mobile Preservation Society.

"We are featuring homes in the Spring Hill area of Mobile. Spring Hill is not a designated historic district, but rather, has a large concentration of individually registered homes on the National Register. This year's tour also offers behind-the-scenes passes into some of Mobile's most historic churches.

"This popular event is enjoyed by our visitors and locals alike," McElhaney says. "Enjoy the ease of traveling between homes by taking advantage of our transportation. Park centrally and ride the trolley to the homes, which are handpicked by our local architectural historians."

In lavish Southern style, the fundraiser promises delicious treats served in a setting reminiscent of daysgone-by. Admission is \$12 for adults and \$8 for children, 12 years and younger, and includes a tour of the mansion. Don't forget to stop by the gift shop.

Built in 1855 by Judge John Bragg, the mansion is a 13,000-square foot Greek Revival at 1906 Springhill Ave. Bragg built the home for his wife and family to enjoy Mobile's social season, Thanksgiving through Mardi Gras. Bragg family members split their time between the mansion and their cotton plantation in Lowndes County outside of Montgomery. Judge Bragg died in 1878, and four additional families have owned the home since his passing.

The long-term goal is to restore the building, grounds and furnishings to reflect lifestyles of previous

Properties of 2015 Mobile Historic Homes Tour

Thomas Shannon Hunter House, 4058 Old Shell Road

Dating from 1923, this Colonial Revival residence was designed by George B. Rogers, a prominent Mobile architect. Of the 100-plus private homes designed by Rogers, the Hunter House is the only one to remain



in the hands of descendants of the original owners. The expansive landscaped grounds surrounding the main residence date from the mid-19th Century.

Pentel-Horst House, 12 Provident Lane

Built for Russian émigré interior designer Irene Pentel in 1962, this house is one of Mobile's finest mid-20th Century modernistic gems. With her home, Pentel not only provided Mobilians with a three-dimensional calling card of her talents, but also a subtle architectural cocktail that blends two currents of modern design – Mobile's marriage of Fallingwater and Glass House.

St. Paul's Chapel, 4051 Old Shell Road

St. Paul's Chapel is the most picturesque of Mobile's historic houses of worship. Dating from 1859, this delightful building combines forms, motifs and construction methods associated with Greek Revival, Italianate and Gothic Revival. A finely scaled portico fronts a board-and-batten-sided building featuring round-headed windows with Gothic tracery. The design has long been attributed to Albert Stein, founder of Mobile's Waterworks, and John Dawson, owner of nearby Azalea Hall. The building still serves the Episcopal community of Spring Hill.

1 Country Club, 1 Country Club Road

Of all the Period Revival styles of the first half of the 20th Century, none possessed as much local nuance and mystique as the Spanish Colonial Revival and Mission styles. No building of the city's Spanish colonial era rivaled houses such as 1 Country Club. It is one of the best preserved of Country Club Estates houses showcasing a Latin flair. With their stuccoed walls, tiled roofs and exposed rafters, these houses lent an air of exoticism to Spring Hill's oldest planned development.

"Bricks and Mortar," 4670 Old Shell Road

Dating from the 1920s, this spacious 20th Century picturesque dwelling is an architectural manifestation of the Golden Age of suburban expansion in Mobile. Starting in 1900, individual dwellings and consciously planned residential developments advanced far beyond the city center into surrounding farmlands and summer communities. Built just outside of Country Club Estates, the property has a history that is only beginning to be rediscovered. The main house is this year's "bricks and mortar" tour.

Spring Hill Graveyard

Few environments are as atmospheric as Spring Hill's Graveyard. Shrouded in trees and enclosed by fencing, this hauntingly romantic landscaped setting is one of the unsung wonders of Mobile's cultural landscape. The park-like setting is filled with handsome memorials of individuals and families who defined Mobile's past and still impact the city's development and progress. A meander through Spring Hill Graveyard allows for an experiential history of Mobile.

St. Joseph's

Spring Hill College is Alabama's oldest institution of higher education. St. Joseph's Chapel is the college's spiritual and geographical center. Dating from 1909, the building perpetuates the Gothic Revival motifs of Spring Hill's monumental Administration Building. The firm of Downey and Denham, architects of numerous notable homes on North Monterey Street, designed this handsome collegiate Gothic building.

Solidarity Chapel

Dating from 1850, Solidarity Chapel constitutes the oldest surviving structure on Spring Hill College's park-like campus. The temple feel intimated by the gabled façade imparts a Greek Revival air that worked in concert with Spring Hill's early classical buildings. The elegant simplicity and amenability to wood construction were just two reasons behind the pervasive and long running popularity of Greek Revival in Mobile. Solidarity Chapel exemplifies the nobility and the practicality of the idiom.

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

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Biloxi Adds Baseball

Snowbirds who want to see future Major League baseball stars or just see some good-ole fashioned Double-A baseball in some of the prettiest minor-league baseball parks in the nation will soon have three choices all in a 120-mile radius.

The Biloxi (Miss.) Shuckers are joining the Southern League in 2015. They are part of an I-10 connection that includes the Mobile (Ala.) BayBears and the Pensacola (Fla.) Blue Wahoos, all within 2 hours of each other.

The Shuckers' ownership bought the team from Huntsville, Ala., and are an affiliate of the Milwaukee Brewers. They will play in MGM Park, a 6,000-seat facility, that will swell to 6,500 for standing-room only crowds.

Co-owner Tim Bennett said the original plan to bring baseball to Biloxi started 11 years ago.

"But we had Hurricane Katrina (in 2005), then the recession, then the oil spill," he said. "It's hard to believe we're finally here. We had all kinds of obstacles, but now everyone is on board."

The ballpark is also a boost to the coast area. Plans are to bring in big-name concerts and the stadium will be able to accommodate 14,000 fans. A bowling complex and entertainment center, as well as a 250-room hotel will eventually be built adjacent to the ballpark.

Plus, with the nearby casinos and hotels,

there are about 2,000 hotel rooms within walking distance.

Bennett said they are on track with their season-ticket goals and all of the suites have been sold. He said watching how the Pensacola team started out three years ago and the Shuckers hiring experienced baseball people has given them information to ensure their start is just

"I've surrounded myself with the very best people," Bennett said. "We want this to be an experience where people want to come back."

BLUE WAHOOS

as successful.

There's a reason why Shuckers' front-office personnel watched the Blue Wahoos. The Pensacola team opened its waterfront park three years ago and has topped 300,000 fans in each of its first three seasons.

"We are exactly where we wanted to be," said team owner Quint Studer. "Our focus wasn't going to be on the first couple of years because we knew it would be a success with the



newness of being an affiliated minor-league team. Our focus was always Year 3 and beyond."

For the fourth year in a row, season tickets are sold out and there's a waiting list for businesses wanting to be a sponsor on the outfield wall.

"It's a great testament to our employees



and fans," Studer said. "We've been more aggressive in measuring the fan experience and the employee satisfaction. It's always hold what you have and give a little bit more."

The Blue Wahoos, an affiliate of the Cincinnati Reds, open their home schedule April 9 against Biloxi and will schedule buses to take their fans to games at Mobile and Biloxi. Earlier this year, the team announced that PGA Tour star and defending Masters champion Bubba Watson has purchased part of the team.

"The Southern League is a fun journey," Studer said. "Now you can go from Jacksonville to Biloxi and see four teams along I-10, then go up through Mississippi and Tennessee."

The Mobile BayBears have been playing at Hank Aaron Stadium since 1997. Winners of the Southern League championship in 2011 and 2012, the team opens its home schedule April 15 against Biloxi.

FLORIDA SPRING TRAINING

Baseball is right around the corner. And for Snowbirds in central and south Florida, it's here.

Fifteen major-league baseball teams are in spring training in Florida as they all set their sights on a World Series title. Exhibition games start March 1 and go through April 4. Opening Day is April 6.

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
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St. Patrick's Day Festivities

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

Seashore Visitor Center in Gulf Breeze, Fla., and other locations.



Mr. Bowden and other leaders in the 1960s foresaw the rampant development that was to come along our seashores - and he fought tirelessly to preserve a piece of it for the rest of us. Gulf Islands National Seashore stretches from the Mississippi Gulf Coast to the Florida Panhandle. There you can observe nature as the first explorers did several hundred years ago.

Day visitors and campers at Fort Pickens enjoy Bowden's legacy. Visitors to the Perdido Key, Okaloosa Island, Navarre Beach and Mississippi coast areas enjoy ample trails and picnic facilities.

One of the prettiest drives anywhere is the stretch known as Earle Bowden Way on state road 399 between Pensacola Beach and Navarre Beach.

We thank you, Mr. Bowden for your foresight. You are an icon whose life has had – and will have - an effect on generations to come.



If you enjoy reading about history, then these two books will help bring the Emerald Coast stretch between Fort Walton Beach/Okaloosa Island and Destin to life.





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
