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
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Welcome!

Q. Where are you originally from and where do you live now?

After marriage we lived in a variety of places including Washington D.C., Panama Canal Zone, Minneapolis, and Phoenix, Arizona, but the majority of our life was in Forest Lake, Minnesota, until we retired and moved to Northfield, Minnesota, a college town on the Cannon River, 30 miles south of Minneapolis.

Q. What kind of work did you do? When did you retire?

the U.S. Army. Sandy worked about 40 years as a nurse primarily with infants and children. She spent 35 years working at Children's Hospital of Minnesota.

Q. Did you travel south for a week or more in the winter before retiring?

A. Yes, we traveled to Mexico, Texas, South Florida and the Pensacola/Orange Beach/Gulf Shores area before retiring.

Q. How did you find the Perdido Key area – and Eden Condominiums?

A. Dick's sister and her husband stayed at Eden when they retired and loved it. When we were looking for a place to call our winter home she suggested Eden. We visited and were very impressed with the beautiful grounds, the friendly staff and the layout of the condominiums. We

were hooked. This will be our fifth winter staying at Eden and we think of it as our winter home. Dick's sister also stays at Eden for the winter.

Q. What kinds of activities do you like to do when here? How often do you play golf?

A. We are both avid golfers. Dick has been playing since being introduced to the sport as a caddy when he was 13 years old. Sandy has been playing for about 20 years. We golf three times a week or more at Perdido Bay Golf Club where we get a seasonal winter membership. Dick plays wally-ball three times a week with friends and Sandy enjoys water aerobics, yoga, line

dancing and playing mahjongg. We also enjoy the walking trails in the state parks and, of course, walking the beach, which is always a treat.

Q. What is it about Perdido Bay Golf that keeps you coming back? Do you play any other courses while here?

A. We love the golf course and recommend it to friends and others who are here and looking for a golf course to play. We have been winter members at Perdido Bay Golf course for the past

four years and will join again this season. The course is challenging and fun to play; the staff in the Pro Shop and restaurant friendly and welcoming. We think it is a great value for a quality course. We also play some of the other great courses in the area. There are certainly lots to choose from.



Q. Do you have any favorite traditions? Foods or restaurants?

A. Over the years we have developed some traditions, such as the Christmas Boat Parade on the Intracoastal Waterway, Christmas Eve dinner at McGuire's Pub, the New Year's Polar Plunge at the Flora-Bama, the annual Missouri Snowbird Trivia contest to support the





Q. Do you take side trips visiting attractions? Do you travel to other parts of Florida during your stay? Or other places like New Orleans?

A. We have taken side trips to Orlando and New Orleans, but typically we are content to stay in the area. We are still finding new places to explore and things to do.

Q. Has becoming a Snowbird been what you thought it would be?

A. When we first started traveling south for the winter, we weren't sure how long we wanted to be away from home so we started with 6 weeks, but that very quickly turned into 31/2 months. We love the Perdido Key area and it has become our winter home. When the days in Minnesota get shorter and colder, we look forward to making the trip South to see all the friends we have made over the years and get back to the beach. We have been coming here long enough that the local people in the restaurants, stores, golf course and library recognize us and greet us with "welcome back." It always feels good to be back.



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

Gulf Coast offers numerous learning opportunities for Snowbirds

Snowbirds know better than anyone that learning never ends.

And just because Snowbirds are away from home during the winter is no reason for their learning to stop either.

Colleges and other organizations across the northern Gulf Coast offer continuing education programs, lectures and more that are intended to spur discovery and thought. Here's a taste of what they have to offer:

Pensacola State College

While all of PSC's five campuses offer continuing education opportunities, two are very close to areas where Snowbirds congregate.

"PSC's South Santa Rosa Center and Warrington campus are especially convenient to those who are wintering at Gulf Breeze, Pensacola Beach, Navarre or Perdido Key," said Michael Listau, coordinator of recreation and leisure at PSC's Continuing Education Department.



"Our temporary residents often take advantage of Continuing Education classes as a way to meet new people and connect with the community," he said. "Taking a class is another opportunity to socialize with those who share some of the same interests."

PSC classes that might interest Snowbirds include belly dancing, fitness, aquatics, Spanish, German, computers for seniors, creative writing, floral design, Spot of Tea, basic photography, nature photography and dog obedience.

"Several PSC leisure courses are created with winter residents in mind," Listau said. "Rather than offering all classes in 10- or 12-week sessions, Pensacola State College now offers several workshops and classes that last just a couple of weeks or a month."

Cost varies, but there is no difference in cost for Florida residents and non-residents. Prospective students may request a schedule booklet or ask questions by contacting the Continuing Education Department at 850-484-1797 or ce@pensacolastate.edu.

"We welcome our temporary residents to teach classes where they have a skill and a passion," he said.

Center for Lifelong Learning

Snowbirds play an integral role at the Center for Lifelong Learning in Fort Walton Beach, according to CCL President Martha Bradford.

"They return to us year after year and share their information with others," Bradford said. "Dozens of Snowbirds over the years have volunteered to teach classes through CLL. They enjoy our community of learners and make friends during classes or special events with one another and locals."

CCL offers more than 70 classes, including yoga, Zumba, iPad, the Rise of Isis, wine tasting, humor in literature and films and much more.

"Snowbirds also enjoy our free Friday special events in the auditorium, our campus café and our sincere efforts to please," she said. "We love the Snowbirds. They volunteer. They donate time and money to our community. And we encourage them to laugh and have fun."

CCL offers two eight-week terms per year. The fall term begins in September and winter term begins in early January. It also has several double period classes that last only four weeks.

Students may enroll in as many as four classes for a one-time fee of \$50.

CCL is always looking for suggestions for new courses and help teaching them.

"We ask students to complete questionnaires each term to evaluate their classes and we ask them to suggest new classes and instructors," Bradford said.

Northwest Florida State College

Snowbirds in the Fort Walton Beach/Destin area can choose from any of the NWFSC campuses for educational enrichment – campuses located in Niceville, DeFuniak Springs, Fort Walton Beach and South Walton.

"Classes begin in January and run through the semester," said Laura Schultze, NWFSC's continuing education coordinator. "Most are done by the first week in March to enable Snowbirds to attend."

Cost for continuing education classes at NWFSC range from \$15 to \$80 depending on the length of the course.

"We are a self-sustaining department and charge enough to cover our costs of instruction," Schultze said. "The fees are the same for all students (residents and nonresidents alike)."



Sea shores offer sea shells – if you know where to look

Practically everyone who has ever visited a beach has stopped to pick up a shiny sea shell and marvel at its symmetry, color and even acoustics.

Jim Brunner, treasurer of the Gulf Coast Shell Club, said such casual shell collecting is just the beginning of an art form called "shelling." It's practiced across the northern Gulf Coast.

"It can range from the tourist who picks up a shell on the beach to use as a reminder of a perfect vacation, to the oysterman who owes his livelihood to the shells he collects, to those who are fascinated with the endless beauty and variation of mollusks, or to the amateur and professional scientists who delve into mystery of shells," said Brunner, who lives in Panama City.

The Gulf Coast Shell Club meets monthly, except July and December, on every second
Tuesday at 7 p.m. at the Lake
Huntington Clubhouse, located
at 3504 West 15th St., Panama City.
Annual club dues are \$8 for an individual or
\$12 for a family.

"Meetings include an educational segment and a raffle of specimen-quality shells as well as a social sharing of events and activities of the membership," Brunner said. "The club also hosts monthly field trips to local collecting areas."

The Gulf Coast Shell Club provides scholarships to marine science students, as well as classes and demonstrations to any group interested in shells. The group publishes a guide to local shells called "Seashells of the Florida Panhandle," distributes an e-newsletter and holds an annual shell show. The group also occasionally hosts artistic activities and an in-club show.

"We have several active Snowbird members of the club who add a unique perspective," he said. "Shell collecting can be a relatively inexpensive hobby that can be practiced year-round. Collecting here during the winter can be pursued at home via online resources and by communication with club members."

The eastern Panhandle is an especially good area for shelling, according to Brunner.

"There are over 640 identified species of shells in the Florida Panhandle and probably another 500 yet to be found. Taken in total, this equals or exceeds those of most other areas," he said. "The eastern Florida Panhandle has a series of well protected bays with enough water exchange to support the salinity needed for a wide variety of species."

However, the Pensacola area does not have an especially good reputation for shelling.

"According to our members from that area, the Pensacola coast has no good shelling areas unless a strong storm has occurred," he said.

Charlene Mauro, director of the Navarre Beach Marine Science Station, said knowing when and where to look for shells is the key to success. "No two beaches are the same when it comes to shelling, nor does any one beach have the same selection of shells from day to day," Mauro said. "Look for shells at low tide and after storms or unusually strong tides."

All beaches have shells, she said, just some more than others.

"The hardest-to-find shells, and those in the best condition, are considered the most valuable to collectors who often look for live shells, since they are in the best condition. A live shell is one that still has the living animal inside, be it clam or conch," Mauro said.

"Shelling must be one of the least expensive hobbies available. All you really need is a bag or bucket to put the shells in — a separate bag for the more fragile shells is helpful — and, unless you are an expert, a good shell identification guide is a must."

Later this season, Navarre Beach Marine Science Station will be offering Beaches and Barrier Islands classes specifically for Snowbirds, but Mauro said the dates have not been set yet.

Snowbirds in Alabama and Mississippi also have the chance to find seashells by the seashore.

Doug Shelton is owner and malacologist at Alabama Malacological Research Center in Mobile, Ala. As a malacologist, Shelton's job is to study mollusks. He credits sea shells as spurring his interest as a child, even though he grew up far from the sea.

"My first introduction to sea shells was when I was 10 years old," he said. "An aunt who lived in Florida brought some shells back to my grandmother, and I was fascinated."

While he is not aware of an organized shelling groups along the Alabama or Mississippi coasts, there are places to see and collect shells – if you know where to look.

"It depends a lot on the weather," Shelton said. "Snorkeling, you can usually find them pretty well."

In Alabama, he suggested shell hunters try Little Lagoon, Bayou St. John and Fort Morgan in Baldwin County, and Fort Gaines and the West End on Dauphin Island.

In Mississippi, Shelton said the beaches people see driving along the main coastal highway are manmade and not especially good for shelling. Instead, he suggested barrier islands like Petit Bois Island, Horn Island, Cat Island and Ship Island. These all must be accessed by boat.

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


FAMILY FUN: The Gulf Coast Exploreum offers rotating exhibits and permanent activities designed to bring the scientist out in all of us. You'll notice an Oyster statue out in front of the Exploreum, which is a great starting point to walk The Oyster Trail throughout downtown Mobile (how many can you visit?).

PORT: The downtown waterfront of Mobile, Alabama is full of rich history, culture and economic importance to the region. This bustling port welcomes ships from all over the world along with tug boats and barges that roam the many rivers of North America. See them all up close from a USCG Certified passenger vessel with Wild Native Tours. The city skyline, maritime museum, Austal shipyards, cruise terminal and cruise ship are also seen on this tour. Courteous and knowledgable guides will educate and entertain as you cruise these local waters.



HISTORY LOVERS: Take an historic city tour, starting at Fort Conde, by car, van, trolley or duck boat. These usually last an hour to an hour and a half, which leaves plenty of time to explore historic downtown Mobile on foot, including the History Museum of Mobile and the Mobile Carnival Museum or hop across the Mobile River to board an authentic World War II battleship, the USS ALABAMA.

SHOPAHOLICS: Several new locally owned clothing boutiques, gift shops, vintage and antique stores and art galleries are located within blocks of each other downtown. The Florida Chautauqua is a descendant of the larger Chautauqua adult education movement that began in Chautauqua, N.Y., in 1874, which soon spurred similar events around the country. The Florida Chautauqua Association began in 1884, holding its first assembly in 1885 and its last in 1928. In 1997, the Florida Chautauqua was reborn in DeFuniak Springs.

"Our organization was created to revive the assemblies, and we have, in the last few years, merged with the family that ran the original Florida Chautauqua," said Robert Daniel, historian and archivist for the Florida Chautauqua Association.

"Today we hold a four-day, conference-style assembly, with fun and educational sessions throughout the weekend, educational exhibits and functions for those who attend," he said. "Our goal is to rebuild to function as the original Chautauqua did, and as our Mother Chautauqua, in New York still does."

"I think the various subjects to be presented will be interesting and fun for those who will attend," Daniel said. "In the ability to interact with the presenters, and meet others from throughout the nation, we often build many new friendships and almost treat the assembly as a fun weekend reunion with old friends. Anyone familiar with the Chautauqua Movement will feel at home here."

The annual event is usually popular with Snowbirds, he said.

"We hope to continue to draw Snowbirds," Daniel said. "Many are familiar with the Chautauqua Movement, as it still operates in the north."


