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# **Second-Generation Snowbirds**



#### Karen and Joe Moosekian are among a growing number of second-generation Snowbirds.

The Rochester, Minn., couple was first introduced to South Walton County when it was sparsely populated with miles of towering pines that largely hid the secret of some of the most beautiful beaches in the world. Joe's parents traveled to the area one winter on the recommendation of a



friend and later became part-time residents spending October through May in the area. The Moosekian's met in college and raised two children who count their annual Walton County trips among their favorite childhood memories.

Joe, 70, and a Vietnam veteran, was recruited by the Ford Motor Company as an engineering apprentice. That opportunity translated into a 39-year career where he retired with a position in upper management. Karen, 68, trained as a dental assistant, later served as an active volunteer in community and finally retired as a church secretary when the couple decided they wanted to have more free time to travel. The couple are active in the 2000+ member Walton County Snowbird Club where Joe is a former president and Karen is the master communicator who shares information about the club's more than 40 activities with local media and for the website.

Here we discover their story:

**Q.** How did you discover the Destin/Walton County area?

**A.** Joe's parents had discovered it from a neighbor at their summer cottage. This couple spent summers on Russell Island in Michigan and winters in Destin, Fla. They invited Joe's parents down to see what the area was like and they fell in love with it. For many years Joe's parents spent October - May at Seascape. Each year our family

and Joe's sister's family would come down during Easter break to visit. Joe's Dad would find us our own condos to rent and we would spend the week enjoying family time. **Q.** When you were in your working years did you talk about how you would spend your retirement years?

A. Because Joe's parents had wintered in Destin, and we absolutely fell in love with this area many years ago – it was somewhat like the family tradition - we just always planned to winter here.

**Q.** How long have you been coming down? When did you start spending extended periods of time there?

**A.** We have been coming down for over 30 years to visit Joe's parents. In 2002, Karen

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# **Pensacola's Story:** Words and wisdom of historian

Words and wisdom of historian John Appleyard come alive at new interactive storytelling cottage

Storytelling has become a lost art in today's world of 120-character tweets and off-the-cuff social media posts. But in Pensacola, 93-year-old prolific historian, author and storyteller John Appleyard continues to weave and craft stories on his trusty 1954 Royal typewriter with tales of one of America's earliest settlements and its journey through modern times.



And now those stories can be heard and viewed through a collection of videos available on demand at The Appleyard Storytelling Cottage in Historic Pensacola Village. Appleyard also has more than 200 book titles to his credit, many available for sale next door at the Tivoli High House, which serves as the complex's ticket and visitor information center.

run today by his son, Dick. The small cottage is open 10 a.m. – 4 p.m. Tuesday through Saturday on a walk-in basis. Appleyard spends a few hours per week at the cottage but he can arrange to be there for lectures for groups of 12 or more upon request and availability. Comfortable seating in front of a cozy fireplace beckons visitors to view videos on a thoroughly modern screen. Historical artwork and memorabilia line the walls. A display case houses Appleyard's preferred typewriter.

"We wanted to make it as comfortable a place as you can imagine," said Appleyard. "The advantage of the cottage is people who come down to the village walk here, there and everywhere (including Pensacola's thriving Palafox Street in the heart of





downtown) and they are tired. Here you can come in, sit down, punch a button and be entertained. Historic Pensacola is managed by the University of West Florida and plans are to continue to expand daily events to attract year-round visitors so it can one day be a "mini Williamsburg." Appleyard also is working on developing some smaller "storybooks" on how family life was lived in a pivotal time around 1888 when the city he says "grew up" by adding a modern utilities and a streetcar system. Also being introduced are smaller "stories" about some of the historical sites around Pensacola that will give visitors and locals more detail and context. One thing that has never changed is Appleyard's loyalty to his beloved Eleanor who now lives at an Alzheimer care facility where he joins her daily for breakfast and dinner. Pensacola's history and his loving family occupy the rest of his time. He

also lectures and writes a column for the local paper and is booked by area organizations.

"Laissez les bons temps rouler!"

Translated from French, that means, "Let the good times roll.'

Once the red-and-green garland of Christmas is stored away, the Gulf Coast reaches for purple, green and gold bunting to celebrate Mardi Gras or, Fat Tuesday.

Known as Carnival in other parts of the world, Mardi Gras is the day before Ash Wednesday, the beginning of the 40 days of Lent, a liturgical season of sacrifice, penance and reflection leading up to Easter.

But before the fast, comes the feast. Mardi Gras was first celebrated in the North America in 1703 by French prisoners in Mobile. The tradition spread through the Gulf Coast, largely through French influence.

Mardi Gras events have customarily been coordinated by social clubs called "krewes" complete with royal courts – a tradition that continues to this day in many communities. The celebration has grown beyond its religious origins to become a time of revelry, community fun and commerce.

Today, virtually every community along the northern Gulf Coast celebrates Mardi Gras with parades including "throws" of Moon Pies, plastic beads, stuffed animals and other goodies - elegant balls, banquets, charitable fundraising and other activities.

# Mobile, Ala.

Mobile is the proud birthplace of Mardi Gras. Following that first Mardi Gras celebration in 1703, the holiday quickly became an institution in

#### Alabama's port city.

"Our first settlers, our founders, were French, and they brought their customs and traditions from their homeland," said Judi Gulledge, executive director of the Mobile Mardi Gras Association. "Carnival celebrations had been held all over Europe since the early 1500s."

In 1711, a paper-mache bull was pulled down Dauphin Street in downtown Mobile in what is believed to be the first Mardi Gras parade in North America. In 1875, the Alabama Legislature declared Mardi Gras – referred to as Shrove Tuesday – a holiday in Mobile. Dozens of Mardi Gras organizations have formed over the years, all with their own traditions and events.

"We do not use the term 'krewe' in Mobile," Gulledge said. "We refer to our organizations as 'mystic societies.'" For the last two decades, Mobile has averaged about 38 Mardi Gras parades every year.

"Carnival begins unofficially on the eleventh day of the eleventh month," she said. "That said, most celebrations in Mobile are from mid-November through Fat Tuesday."

All Mobile Mardi Gras parades are held downtown

Gulledge said the parades that Snowbirds might be most interested in occur from the Thursday before Fat Tuesday through Fat Tuesday, Feb. 23-28. "It's fun, safe and very worth a trip to experience

firsthand," she said. "Nothing can be said to adequately detail the sights, sounds and smells that define Mardi Gras."

#### Alabama Gulf Coast

The Town of Dauphin Island attracts thousands of visitors each year with two parades, Krewe de la Dauphin on Jan. 28 and the Town of Dauphin Island Parade on Feb. 4. There are nine parades staged between Foley, Daphne and Fairhope on Alabama's Eastern Shore (see master schedule) and numerous others in small surrounding towns. Parades are scheduled Feb. 25 in Orange Beach and Feb. 28 in Gulf Shores.

#### Pensacola, Fla.

Mardi Gras celebrations in Pensacola date to 1874, according to Danny Zimmern, the president of Pensacola Mardi Gras, Inc., , which began coordinating Pensacola's Mardi Gras events 17 years ago. It started as an event with balls and parades hosted by the city's most prominent families.

"Over most of those years (since 1874), Pensacola Mardi Gras was just the weekend before Fat

Tuesday," Zimmern said. More recently, "it just grew and grew and grew to become a season. Pensacola Mardi Gras kicks off on the traditional Jan. 6 date, also known as the "Twelfth Night" after Christmas. That event includes a celebration and blessing of the fleet in downtown Pensacola. Various Mardi Gras balls and other events are scheduled through Fat Tuesday.

Pensacola has about 90 krewes and between 40 and 50 balls each Mardi Gra season, Zimmern said. Many of Pensacola's krewes have charitable goals. For example, the Krewe du YaYas are dedicated to fighting breast cancer. The Krewe Karrus Navalis sponsors a food drive competition between the Pensacola krewes to see who can collect the most food and money for Manna Food Bank. The Pensacola area features three parades including one on Pensacola Beach - but the main

parade is the downtown Pensacola Grand Mardi Gras Parade, set for Feb. 25, the Saturday afternoon before Fat Tuesday.

The Pensacola Grand Mardi Gras Parade is huge, including some 230 entries with about 6,000 people in the parade and taking about four hours to view from start to finish.

Zimmern says with upwards of 100,000 observers, it's the biggest event in downtown Pensacola every year. Details: www.pensacolamardigras.com.

#### **Mississippi Gulf Coast**

Mardi Gras celebrations on the Mississippi Gulf Coast date back more than a century, starting with events in

"The Gulf Coast Carnival Association traces its roots back to 1908 and Biloxi's first Mardi Gras parade, which included 17 floats," said Steve Polk, the association's captain of carnival.

"In 1929, the Biloxi celebration expanded to include other coastal cities," Polk said. "Mardi Gras has been consistent throughout the years with the

exception of a few years during the World War era. The GCCA parade has rolled through the streets of Biloxi every year since 1952, including the years after Hurricanes Camille and Katrina." Today, there are more than 25 parades on the Mississippi Gulf Coast each year from Pascagoula to Waveland.

"Most, if not all, Mardi Gras events (along the Mississippi coast) are put on by krewes or associations," Polk said. "The difference between a krewe and an association is that members of krewes are voted on by the

#### Pensacola Beach, Fla.

The first Mardi Gras celebration on Pensacola Beach was the first beach parade in February

The original idea was "to shake off the doldrums of wintert," said Shelley Waters Johnson, whose mother, Jane Waters Cooper, was instrumental in establishing Mardi Gras on Pensacola Beach.

"Islanders have always had a knack for celebrating, so they were naturals to embrace the fun of Mardi Gras,"

said Johnson, a member of the the beach's original Mardi Gras group, the Krewe of Wrecks. She is also a member of the Krewe of Nauga and founder of the Krewe of Kids, a local Mardi Gras group exclusively for children. Krewe of Wrecks events include various meals, ceremonies, and the parade. Events are open to the public - some are ticketed, some are free, "On parade day, the Krewe of Wrecks invites other krewes to

# Bay County, Fla.

Panama City boasts one of the newest Mardi Gras celebrations on the Gulf Coast.

The Krewe of St. Andrews was established in November 1997, said Tom Bowdoin, a charter member of the krewe. "This was a Merchant Association meeting and the agenda included ideas to bring more attention to the area and the revitalization of the little village of St. Andrews."

Business leaders also discussed a desire for what was then Bay County's only other krewe, the Krewe of Domingue Youx, to have an parade location outside of their annual route through the Bay Point subdivision in order to accommodate growing interest and larger crowds.

"We decided to form our krewe and invite Domingue Youx to parade with us down Beck Avenue," Bowdoin said.

The first Krewe of St. Andrews parade and festival was held in February 1998, and is now the city's largest with crowds during the two-day event reaching over 60,000

This year, the Krewe of St. Andrews' main parade will include more than 15 local and out-of-town krewes with more than 40 floats filled with riders throwing tons of beads, stuffed animals and doubloons.

Over the years, the Krewe of St. Andrews has raised more than \$100,000 for local scholarships, charities and contributions and has generated many volunteer hours for various fundraising events.

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# **Conversation with the dentist - Dr. Frank Dentremont**

# Q: What are the first steps to alleviate dental pain?

A: Quick and severe dental pain is usually the body's "crisis alert" which is screaming "something's wrong!" A toothache seldom comes on suddenly without some early warning. In football parlance, the best offense is a good defense. Be sure if you're a Snowbird (or anyone for that matter) to have your home dentist up North give you a thorough check-up before you come down to make sure you don't have any hidden cavities or inflammations which might erupt while you're down here.

Too late? Seek an emergency visit with a dentist down here ASAP. If you can't get to a dentist then go to an urgent care center and get screened by their facility. Most often severe and sudden pain comes from a tooth infection. Being treated by antibiotics ASAP will begin the healing process. Treating pain may require prescription pain medication but until then use your extra strength over-the-counter pain medication of choice in accordance with their directions. DO NOT place a pain medication such as aspirin directly in the

# **Q:** What should you do if a tooth has broken off?

A: A broken tooth can be a very sudden and painful situation. A tooth's structure

(biologically) resembles an ice cube and it matters how the tooth breaks. If it shears laterally then most often times it avoids a nerve exposure and can be repaired with a filling or a crown. If it shears more vertically then not only does it break it often exposes the nerve which will require a root canal or an extraction. Only your dentist can make that diagnosis but you should seek a dental consultation ASAP. DO NOT try to glue the broken tooth back on with "Superglue". Aside from it making it difficult for the dentist to remove later, it is chemically dangerous to put in your body. "Superglue" is a cyanide-derived compound - a cyanoacrylate. Do you really want to put that in your body?? "Nuff said.

# **Q:** What is the biggest dental issue for seniors?

**A.** The biggest issue I see with senior dental care is "Accumulated Neglect". By that I mean that seniors present to my office with an accumulation of a life of dental care - the good, the bad, and the ugly (my apologies to Clint Eastwood). When a patient has cared for their teeth and their body their entire life then their teeth normally present with a good dentition and their mindset is maintenance and keeping their teeth for the rest of their life. When a person has neglected their body it usually follows that their teeth have gone through neglect, too. Seniors in this category often have multiple missing teeth and are resigned to losing them in their later years. A toothache or loose teeth from gum disease often result in extraction and we have to make partials or dentures to compensate.

# Q: When should someone consider partial or full dentures and why?

A: A partial or full denture should be considered when the patient's existing teeth are "hopeless" - when there are no practical ways to restore or repair their teeth. Tooth loss in seniors most often comes from gum disease, but can come from trauma (a broad term including cavities, tooth fracture, etc.) When the tooth loss impedes the ability of a patient to chew their food properly, then food metabolism in the body suffers. So proper nutrition is an important consideration. Social self-esteem is also an important consideration. When a person loses teeth in the smile zone then socially that can impede a person's ability to interact with others. Bad-looking front teeth which cannot be restored are a prime reason for partials or dentures. Bringing a smile back to a person can help a person get a new job, or meet new people, etc. With the evolution of dental implant technology and newer dental materials, we have more options for replacing hopeless

teeth. It is the goal of dentistry to bring implant technology to the mainstream to replace dentures and partials. Many dental insurance plans now pay for implants. In the meantime, if you can't chew properly, can't or won't smile in public, then you should seek a dental health professional to help you improve your overall well-being.

# Q: What health risks are associated with poor dental care?

A: Medical research and science are "light years" ahead of what we knew 30 or 40 years ago. Through science, we now know that many diseases of the body not only have oral manifestations but have ORAL ORIGINS. We know that the plaque which accumulates in the heart is the SAME plague which originates in the mouth. A "dirty" mouth will directly lead to heart disease! We have enough information (through DNA markers, etc.) to see that many organisms which cause disease in the body enter the bloodstream not by cuts or ingestion but through entry in the gums or mouth! We all realize that our mouths can't be "sterilized" to prevent the presence of bacteria or viruses, but keeping our mouths clean and as disinfected as possible will be a future mandate to aid in preventing systemic disease. Poor dental care leads to poor physical health. It's now known to be a certainty in medical and dental science.
