



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The laid-back Dauphin Island life, complete with spectacular sunrises and sunsets and world-class golf nearby, draws Ohio Snowbirds Brenda and Allen Lloyd back to Alabama each year. Brenda, 70, is a retired home

economics teacher while Allen, also 70, retired after 40 years as a project manager for several large companies.

They hail from tiny Clarington, Ohio, (population 500), where they have a view of the Ohio River – and nearby West Virginia. Dauphin Island also has smalltown ambiance with a year-round population of around 1,200 people. The friendliness of the people is one of the main attractions to the region, Brenda said.



The couple was introduced to the state in the early 1990s when Allen had a lengthy project in Huntsville. His work required frequent travel that allowed him to discover a wide variety of golf courses. He found that he enjoyed the Robert Trent Jones golf courses, developed by the state retirement system. One year the couple did a golf tour of the state, playing all of the courses. They cite the Auburn/ Opelika area as one of their favorite destinations. Allen said the quality of the courses is what attracted him to purchase annual winter RJT

packages. He usually plays three to five days per week. Four years ago, the Lloyds rented a furnished apartment in Mobile, Ala., (close to several courses) and the couple discovered they

enjoyed taking day trips to Dauphin Island. So, for the past three years, they have rented at the beach.


Brenda is an avid reader, and she loves photography. Along with the

island's vivid sunrise and sunsets, her favorite subjects include passing shrimp boats, barges and birds and wildlife are favorite subjects. The island's two Mardi Gras parades are something they look forward each season. They also usually take the Mobile Bay ferry across to Fort Morgan and the Gulf Shores area at least once during their stay.

This season the couple hosted their son, Allen II, his wife, Jill, and their two grandsons, Byron, 9, and Winston, 8, in a four-bedroom, three-bath Gulf-front beach home over Christmas and New Year's holiday.

Although scheduled to stay through mid-March, a special "babysitting request" will send them home to Ohio at the end of February for a brief stay before heading out to Montana. They plan to return next season -

after a Christmas trip to Montana. Golf, beach, sunrises and sunsets await.









ROBERT TRENT JONES GOLF TRAIL

Alabama's Robert Trent Jones Golf Trail is the largest golf course construction project ever attempted. In the late 1980's, two important things were on the mind of Dr. David Bronner, CEO of the Retirement Systems of Alabama. First, how to effectively diversify the assets of the state's pension fund; and secondly, how to help the state of Alabama. His philosophy was this: "The stronger the Retirement Systems can make Alabama, the stronger the Retirement Systems will be."

With that in mind, and borrowing a page from the movie, Field of Dreams, Bronner decided to "build it, and they will come" — not to a baseball diamond in a cornfield, but to a dazzling collection of public golf courses in the state of Alabama.



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

BORN TO CELEBRATE







When you're not busy catching beads, there are nearly forty restaurants, bars, delis and cafes to enjoy in downtown Mobile. We've also compiled a suggested list of activities you can do in two, four and six hours in Mobile, perfect to explore before or after the parades.



MARITIME: About 230 steps from the Alabama Cruise Terminal (yes, we counted!) is the one-of-a-kind GulfQuest National Maritime Museum. GulfQuest is the first and only museum dedicated to the Gulf Coast's rich maritime traditions from its discovery in the 1500s to the present day and one of the only interactive maritime museums in the country. So before you head out into the Gulf, learn all about the Gulf. It'll make your cruise that much more interesting, believe us!

PORT & FORT: The downtown waterfront of Mobile, Alabama is full of rich history, culture and economic importance to the region. This bustling port welcomes ships from all over the world along with tug boats and barges that roam the many rivers of North America. See them all up close from a USCG Certified passenger vessel with Wild Native Tours. The city skyline, maritime museum, Austal shipyards, cruise terminal and cruise ship are also seen on this tour. Courteous and knowledgeable guides will educate and entertain as you cruise these local waters. After your port tour, be sure to visit the Fort of Colonial Mobile, an immersive, interactive exhibit about the people who colonized early Mobile.



HISTORY LOVERS: Take an historic city tour, starting at the Visit Mobile Welcome Center, by car, van, trolley or duck boat. These usually last an hour to an hour and a half, which leaves plenty of time to explore historic downtown Mobile on foot, including the History Museum of Mobile and the Mobile Carnival Museum or hop across the Mobile River to board an authentic World War II battleship, the USS ALABAMA.

SHOPAHOLICS: Several new locally owned clothing boutiques, gift shops, vintage and antique stores and art galleries (some will ship your purchases home!) are located within blocks of each other downtown. We know you'll be grabbing some souvenirs in the Caribbean, but hey, taking a little bit of Mobile home with you is pretty awesome, too.

FAMILY FUN: The Gulf Coast Exploreum offers rotating exhibits and permanent activities designed to bring the scientist out in all of us. You'll notice an Oyster statue out in front of the Exploreum, which is a great starting point to walk The Oyster Trail throughout downtown Mobile (how many can you visit?). Mobile's newest addition to outdoor family fun is ArtGo, a self-guided free walking trail and outdoor art gallery that leads visitors to 33 public art pieces/installations. Pick up your map at the Mobile Arts Council at 318 Dauphin Street.




OUTDOORS: With a little more time on your hands, you can explore a little more of what the entire area has to offer. The crown jewel of Mobile, Bellingrath Gardens and Home is about 45 minutes west of the Alabama Cruise Terminal - plan to wander amongst the blooms for a few hours. Or, head east, just a few minutes of downtown and take an airboat ride, sightseeing cruise or guided kayak/canoe tours of the Mobile/Tensaw Delta (the views are a little different from the deck of the cruise ship but fascinating just the same!)

HISTORY AND CULTURE LOVERS: There are several historic homes in or near downtown, each offering guided tours. Pick up a Historic Homes brochure and plan to visit all five during your time here in Mobile. Hit the Mobile Museum Trail, visiting some of the previously mentioned downtown museums but also plan to stop by the largest art museum on the Gulf Coast, the Mobile Museum of Art, the Mobile Medical Museum, and the Archaeology Museum at the University of South Alabama.





Mardi Gras Glossary

Do you speak Mardi Gras? Here are a few definitions to get you started!

King Cake – Circular bread pastry with cinnamon, icing, sugar sprinkles and a small, plastic baby representing Jesus to honor the Christian holiday Epiphany.

Krewe – A group of people who create floats and organize parades. Everyone on a float is in the same krewe. They often do charitable work throughout the year.

MoonPie – The perfect, circular combination of chocolate, graham crackers and marshmallows.

Throws – If it's flying from a float, it's a throw! Throws include beads, Moon Pies, stuffed animals, cups, commemorative "doubloons," T-shirts, small toys and other trinkets.



Krouse and other Snowbird representatives put in many hours planning the events which helps bring a united sense of purpose and camaraderie among the clubs which man stations from cooking, logistics, condiments, cashier, setup and takedown and more.

Although brats are now more common in grocery stores and at events, what makes the tasty Snowbird "Bratfest" Johnsonville brats stand out is the cooking process. First the brats must be thawed, cooked on a grill until firm then bathed for 20 minutes in a combination of water, beer and onions for flavor.



Brats are served with choice of sauerkraut, ketchup, mustard and relish.

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
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



Jacksonian Guard bring Downtown Pensacola's history to life



The tune and rat-tat-tat of a fife and drum and the boom of a volley of musket guns were heard in downtown Pensacola in 1821 and now can still be heard once a month today.

The Jacksonian Guard is a Pensacola re-enactment group of Jacksonian era and Spanish soldiers, fifers and drummers who perform a Colors Ceremony once a month, every third Saturday at noon from March to November, in Plaza Ferdinand, on Palafox Street in downtown Pensacola. The ceremony commemorates Pensacola's 195th Birthday and Florida as a U.S. Territory in 1821.

The plaza, where the ceremony was conducted by U.S. troops under command of the state's first governor, Andrew Jackson, on July 17, 1821 where the transfer of ownership between the U.S. and Spain occurred, still exists.


The Jacksonian Guard was founded by Wesley Odom and Pamela Homyak in April 2016. His Go Retro Tour Company specializes in historic tours and is among the sponsors of the re-enactments, as well as Visit Pensacola and the University of West Florida Historic Trust.

"Pam had been to St. Augustine (Florida) and knew they had organized a large historical celebration in 2009," Odom said. "She said, 'How can we do this in Pensacola?' "

The performance includes soldiers dressed in 1821 period uniforms, fife-and-drum music and the transfer of a Spanish flag to a replica 23-star U.S. flag that first flew over the plaza. They use students ages 12 to 29 to represent the youthful composition of Jackson's army.

Odom says the event helps attract attention to historical Pensacola and has helped to bring in tourism. He said he met a lady who came to Pensacola for the first time to see the Jacksonian Guard.

"She said, she thought it was just a Navy town and it wasn't," he said. "She said it's a charming community. That's exciting to hear."

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
Take the ferry! A new view of the Gulf Coast

Many highways along the Gulf Coast offer scenic drives for Snowbirds to enjoy in their vehicle.

And there's one scenic adventure Snowbirds can take in which they're with their vehicle, but don't have to drive.

Mobile Bay Ferry Service

The Mobile Bay Ferry Service connects Dauphin Island and Fort Morgan across the mouth of Mobile Bay in Alabama. The 40-minute trip gives riders a view of two historic forts - Fort Gaines on Dauphin



"The Mobile Bay Ferry is known as The Gulf Coast's most scenic drive," said Tim Aguirre, general manager of HMS Ferries Alabama. "The 40-minute cruise across Mobile Bay travels between historic Fort Morgan and Fort Gaines where you are likely to see dolphins, pelicans and other marine life. The ferry can carry cars, trucks, motorcycles and motorhomes as well as bicycles for those who want to enjoy a day trip. We are also pet friendly!"

The service has two ferries, the Fort Morgan and the Marissa Mae Nicole. One operates until Memorial Day, then both go in service during the summer months through Labor Day. Prices through April range from \$16 for automobiles, pickup trucks and small RVs to \$35 for motor homes and 5th wheels. Motorcycles are \$10 and additional passengers for every category are \$5 each. Pedestrian tickets are \$5 (children 6-under free).
