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

John retired with 40 years of service in 2001, and the couple settled in a lakeside community in the Toronto area where their sons were working, and John could pursue his favorite activities: golf and fishing. Panama City Beach Serves Up Fun

He is the colorful "mystery man" who pitches in to bring ideas to life in Panama City Beach.

For most of the year, Richard Sanders directs Panama City's Beach's growing sports and events department (he is the VP). Recruited from Georgia where he built and ran a successful tournamentbased sport tourism business, Sanders will soon see the fruition of a major initiative – a massive, state-of-the-art sports complex that will benefit locals and deliver thousands of participants year-round.

Phase one of the \$32 million Panama City Beach Sports Park is scheduled to open in late spring. The facility will feature eight rectangular fields for soccer, lacrosse, rugby and football and five collegiate sized baseball and softball fields and is expected to feed year-round tourism.

While that effort and administering a growing list of special events have kept Sanders busy, he also pitches in during "winter resident" season. He, along with a dedicated tourism staff, bring a personal touch to those who travel hundreds and often thousands of miles to escape winter (many are Canadian.)

In the past few years, staff have created a "homecoming dance," winter resident appreciation days, senior prom, grand finale, golf mystery days and more. Local senior centers, libraries and recreation facilities and local restaurants put out the welcome mat with a myriad of events.

Sanders captures research information from winter residents at these events where he often is a major presence. He started an e-newsletter several years ago to stay in touch – a major advantage in the aftermath of Hurricane Michael. The Convention and Visitor's Bureau was able to quickly provide information on the area's status and to get feedback.

Panama City Beach was largely spared the worst of the storm and Sanders learned that barring health issues, most winter residents vowed (and did) return. Many brought resources to help nearby communities rebuild and have spent considerable hours personally pitching in.

Sanders says that Panama City Beach's emphasis on events to draw yearround tourism also has resulted in a longer Snowbird season (many stay four to six months or become actual residents.) That enthusiasm also has helped diversify growth in the market with many winter residents hosting multi-generations of family and friends seeding tourism for the future.


Mac McAleer: Retiree's hobby gains viral recognition

The Gulf Coast Exploreum's latest blockbuster exhibition, Genghis Khan: The

blockbuster exhibition, Genghis Khan: The Great Civilizer, will be on display in Mobile, Ala., through April 28.

Minnesota Twins Now Double-A Wahoos' MLB Affiliate

For the first time in their eight-year history, the Pensacola Blue Wahoos will begin a new era.

No, the uniforms won't change, the nickname, or the bayfront ambiance provided at Blue Wahoos Stadium.

Instead, it's a change of affiliation. Out with the Reds. In with the Twins.

After being connected with the Cincinnati Reds as their Double-A team in the Southern League since the 2012 inaugural season in Pensacola, the Blue Wahoos are now linked with the Minnesota Twins.

The differences are part of the intrigue for the 2019 season, which begins April 4 when the Blue Wahoos travel to Mobile for a five-game, season-opening series against the Mobile BayBears.

The first home game is April 10 against the Jacksonville Jumbo Shrimp.



"You can see how entrenched this team has been in this community and how it has impacted so many people's lives beyond baseball," said Twins vice president/general manager Thad Levine, who traveled to Pensacola in late January to be part of welcoming event.

Blue Wahoos owner Quint Studer is hoping the Twins bring a partnership which extends beyond having talented baseball players on the field.

Already, it's been different. The Twins hosted the Blue Wahoos staff in Minneapolis for their annual TwinsFest in mid-January. During that weekend event, VisitPensacola.com provided inflatable beach balls that were a big hit.

"So now there's about 11,000 beach balls with Pensacola on them bouncing around Minnesota right now," Studer said, laughing. "So a big part of this was continuing to expand our brand.

"With a big organization like the Twins, you have expertise that we may not have, so you want to learn from them."

In return, the Blue Wahoos welcomed two of the Twins pitching prospects, along with Jeremy Zoll, the Twins minor league director, new Blue Wahoos manager Ramon Borrego, and Levine on Jan. 31 for a full day of events in Pensacola with sponsors, season-ticket holders and fans. It reinforced a relationship the Blue Wahoos seek to build with cross-promotions and marketing. The Twins were previously in Chattanooga, Tennessee as the Chattanooga Lookouts. The Reds returned to Chattanooga to remain in the Southern League as the Double-A team.

The change for Pensacola means a switch from National League to American League in affiliation. At Blue Wahoos home games, the pitcher will no longer be a batter. The designated hitter rule will be in effect as American League affiliate.

The Twins have a similar color scheme with uniforms and caps as the Blue Wahoos. Both teams have agreed to offer fans a chance to win trips to see games in the other city. The marketing staffs of both teams have already shared ideas.

It's these elements the Blue Wahoos believe are important to enhance the fan experience and ensure a freshness that can help sell tickets.

The team has also redesigned and renamed its concession stands and a new Blue Wahoos concession company will offer different items this season.

On the field, the Twins boast one of the bestrated minor league systems in baseball. Many of their top prospects are expected at Blue Wahoos Stadium this season.

"We enjoyed our time in Chattanooga," said Levine, who has been the Twins general manager since 2016. "But when the opportunity came to join with Quint and Pensacola, it was something we didn't want to miss.

"We very much pursued them. The reason is that the organization has done such a tremendous job since opening eight years ago. The stadium has won countless awards for the fan experience.

"I believe our players will weave into the fabric of this community. I think they will be better men for having that experience. That was something important to us as we were making this decision to change affiliations."

BILOXI SHUCKERS: The fifth-year team is the Double-A Affiliate of the

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
