


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
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Our early arrivals tend to enjoy the quiet time before the bustling Snowbird season begins.

Standing with Panama City Beach

Donna and Jim Jacko didn't let a historic hurricane deter their winter plans.


The Broadview Heights, Ohio, couple arrived back to their home-away-from-home in late October 2018 - just two weeks after Hurricane Michael (later determined to be a Category 5 storm) swept across Panama City, Fla. The storm then moved east along the Panhandle and north into southern Alabama and south Georgia, bringing devastation in its wake.

Hurricane Michael formed at the last minute and quickly "blew up" into a powerful 160-mph monster. The couple didn't understand the depth of the devastation until they arrived.

Jim, 74, retired nine years ago after 20 years as an engineer with Rockwell Automation and several other positions before that. Donna, 73, spent 25 years as a medical insurance and billing professional and still helps people understand their insurance and benefits

The Jackos' love story began when they met at a dance when they were 19. They married 3 $\frac{1}{2}$ years later and recently marked their 50th wedding anniversary.

The couple has one son, Joseph, 49, and a 15-year-old granddaughter, Jillian. Both love to fish during their annual spring break visit. They live in Akron, Ohio.






"Australian-Terrier-Yorkie on steroids" - named Abby McGillicuddy "Spike" Jacko, age 14. Spike spent 3 1/2 years "in lockup" before the Jacko's made her their forever family. Some 11 years later, the family knows they are "on borrowed time."

The couple discovered Panama City Beach in 2001 when Jim participated in his first Ironman competition. Since then he's competed in six events (2004, 2007, 2010, 2011, 2014 and 2017.)

Before Michael, Jim had trained all year





for the 2018 competition, which had to be moved elsewhere in the state. He's already begun training for the 2020 event where he can compete in the 75-90 category.

Donna has been a regular volunteer at the "Lucky Puppy" rescue operation. Jim helped people with home repairs soon after their arrival last year through relief efforts coordinated by Saint Dominic's Catholic Church, which suffered its own devastation. The church soldiered on and set up a tent and started taking and distributing relief supplies to thousands. Today the effort is coordinated by Catholic Charities of Northwest Florida while Saint Dominic's is trying to repair its building.

During their six-month annual stay, they are never lonely. They look out for new Snowbirds, especially around the holidays, inviting people to dine and spend time with them.



Jim, a former smoker, is an inspiring sight to many who winter in Panama City Beach's east end. He trains at the condo and nearby using the heated pool and fitness room while cycling nearby. That first Ironman race cemented the Jacko's plans as they contemplated retirement and where they would "Snowbird": Panama City Beach.

The Jackos pitched in immediately at Saint Dominic's Catholic Church (which itself was decimated) organizing and distributing food, clothing, blankets, water, tarps and more. Jim, who has construction skills, also pitched in helping shore up shelter for immediate needs. Both animal lovers, Donna pitched in at the Lucky Puppy rescue, an organization dear to their hearts. The pair continue to volunteer today and urge others who have the time and skills to do the same.

'Legends' show brings Vegas entertainment to Gulf Coast

The holidays will bring the familiar tones of superstars like Tony Bennet, Dolly Parton and Lady Gaga to the Alabama Gulf Coast.

But don't start looking for the tour buses – or high dollar ticket prices – you might expect to accompany entertainment of that caliber. The songs sound like the stars, and the entertainers look like the stars, but don't let your eyes and ears fool you. The performers are tribute artists with the Legends in Concert show, which began a residency at Owa in Foley, Ala., this summer.

The Christmas show started Nov. 19 and includes artists performing as Tony Bennet, Dolly Parton, Lady

Gaga, George Michael and the Blues Brothers. Other artists represented at the show since it opened in Foley include Aretha Franklin, Taylor Swift and Elvis, among others.

"The artists are all singing live with their own natural voices," said Legends Chief Operating Officer Brian Brigner. "There is no lip-syncing or any lead vocal track."

Shows under the Legends banner have been enthralling guests for decades, having started in Las Vegas in 1983.

"The show is still operating in Las Vegas today ... and is currently the longest-running show in town, celebrating 36 years and over 25,000 performances to millions of fans," Brigner said. "Legends has performed in 20 countries and on five continents."

In addition to Owa and Vegas, Legends has year-round venues in Branson, Mo., Myrtle Beach, S.C., and Honolulu, as well as onboard Norwegian Cruise Line. The company also stages annual seasonal engagements in Atlantic City, N.J.; Niagara Falls, Canada; Melbourne, Australia; Foxwoods Casino in Connecticut and regional casinos around the U.S.

The show is very popular with snowbirds, Brigner said.

"They thoroughly enjoy the show and the nostalgia and memories that



come to life," he said. "I like to say that music is the soundtrack of our lives, and I promise that these artists and songs will help them relive old memories and create new ones."

Legends' shows typically last 90 to 120 minutes, including an intermission. In addition to the vocalists, performers include a four-piece, classically trained band.

"They (the early and later shows) are the same," Brigner said. "We offer matinee performances for guests who prefer to not drive at night, families with younger children and seniors who prefer daytime activities."

The Legends show at Owa is located in the Owa Theater in Downtown Owa, the restaurant and shopping destination located outside the front gates at the Owa amusement park. The entire entertainment complex spans over 520 acres.



"The theater itself is amazing and truly state-of-the-art," Brigner said. "The technical capabilities in the room are unmatched in the region, and the lights, sound and video package are what guests are accustomed to seeing on TV award shows and Vegas stages. It is impressive from the moment you walk into the lobby with display cases of memorabilia from actual stars, to the retail and concession spaces, to the decor. The venue is beautiful and all completely new."

The singers in the Legends show are selected via audition from talent worldwide, but others involved with the show are hired locally.

"All of the dancers and tech team are drawn from local talent," Brigner said. "We are very proud of that and providing opportunities for local performers and trained technicians in the arts."

Legends joined Owa after the show found success in similar areas, he said.

"We had concluded very successful engagements in Mississippi, Louisiana and Florida in recent years. We liked that the market was family-friendly and also had distinct seasonality and demographics that would allow us to customize the show for the audience in the market," Brigner explained.

"We're also enthusiastic about the future growth plan at Owa and felt it was the perfect location for our introduction to the area," he said. "It was also interesting that there was no year-round, world-class live entertainment option in the market, and saw this as a great opportunity for our organization."

Pensacola's Snowball Derby is hot

If ever there were a sporting event for Snowbirds in Northwest Florida, it's the annual Snowball Derby stock car race at Five Flags Speedway in Pensacola.

The 52nd running of the event on the high-banked, half-mile oval caps a weekend of racing on Dec. 8.

It's the last race of the year in any area of the United States. That gives drivers the incentive to race hard and do whatever it takes to win the prestigious Tom Dawson Trophy, named for the late creator of the event who decided December would be a good time to bring big-name drivers to the event.



"The Snowball Derby continues to be one of Pensacola's biggest attractions," said Chuck Corder, media director at Five Flags Speedway. "You have the Blue Angels air show in the summer and the Derby come December. The eyes of the stock car racing world

turn to Five Flags when the Derby rolls around."

In the early years, drivers like Darrell Waltrip, Bobby Allison and Rusty Wallace made annual visits to the race. In the last ten years, the focus has been on the younger pack of drivers.

Now, it's the young'uns.

Chase Elliott, now a NASCAR Monster Energy favorite, Christian Eckes and defending champion Noah Gragson have all won the Snowball Derby in their teen years. The one exception is NASCAR champion Kyle Busch, who won the Snowball Derby two years ago.

Gragson, now 21, drove for Kyle Busch Motorsports when he made a late pass over Ty Majeski to win the event last year.





"The venue at Five Flags Speedway is one you don't experience anywhere else on short track racing," said former Snowball Derby polesitter Majeski. "From owner Tim Bryant to people working behind the scenes, the staff does a great job for all the fans. If you're a fan of short-track racing, it certainly has to be on your bucket list."

Racing events start Wednesday, Dec. 4, and continues through Sunday, Dec. 8, when the green flag drops for the 300-lap race. Drivers compete for the 38 starting spots, and only 20 are locked in during Friday's qualifying, which can mean the difference



between racing Sunday or going home early.

"There's nothing like it in short track racing, for sure," Majeski said of the Snowball Derby qualifying trials on that Friday night. "It's a mental game for sure. Qualifying is going to be crucial. Having good track position early in the race is huge."

Drivers from Florida to California will arrive for the event, and others come from Canada and Nova Scotia. Drivers like Harrison Burton, son of Jeff Burton, and Bubba Pollard are set to race.

"Guys in the pits at NASCAR races are talking about the Snowball Derby in the days, weeks and months leading up to the drop of the green flag," Corder said. "The 52nd running this year promises to be no different."

Avoid touching your eyes, mouth and nose unless your hands are clean. Cough or sneeze into your elbow. Use a tissue for your nose, and throw the tissue away immediately and wash your hands right after. Don't use a handkerchief or cloth more than once without washing it.

Get the flu vaccination each year and obtain it early in the season. The flu virus changes

from year to year, so you'll need to update your vaccination annually. Keep in mind that the flu vaccine takes about two weeks to be effective so it's better to get it early in the season.

Boost your immunity year-round: The best way to protect yourself against the flu and any virus is to take care of yourself all the time. Eat nutritious foods and avoid processed ingredients that negatively impact the body. Get plenty of sleep each day. Exercise regularly. Check with your doctor to see if you should consider taking a probiotic or supplement to help keep your immune system strong.

See your doctor if you have any flu-like symptoms. If you feel you have any of the flu symptoms, such as fever, coughing, sore throat, body aches, runny nose and fatigue, contact your doctor. You may be prescribed an antiviral medication like Tamiflu to lessen your condition.

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
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
