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


## Canadian Snowbird Association Hosts Successful Extravaganza in Lakeland

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



## Snowbirds Avid Baseball Fans

If you attend a Baltimore Orioles' spring training game, chances are you'll see Kathy and Ralph Duval hard at work.

The longtime retired couple, who hail from Dudley, Mass., have been a fixture at the recently renovated Ed Smith Stadium in Sarasota, Fla., for 10 years.

They worked with the Cincinnati Reds organization for eight seasons and this is their second year with the Orioles, who relocated from Fort Lauderdale.

Staying busy is a way of life for the couple who marked their 50<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary this past summer by taking their four children, spouses and 11 grandchildren on a cruise.

But March is dedicated to baseball.

"With eight grandsons, you have to love baseball," Kathy said. "We watched it all the time and we enjoy it. We were at a (Reds) game and enjoyed it so much we thought we should just work here."

They then found someone who worked with the organization and today Kathy can most likely be found at the ticket booth while Ralph is an usher.

The couple is excited about the renovations and improvements to Ed Smith Stadium.

"It looks like a coliseum from the outside. So nice," Kathy said. "I can't wait to get inside and see it for myself."

Included among the stadium improvements are a new façade with an old-time ballpark feel. Fans can expect

new seating, renovated restrooms, shaded areas and more food vendors.

Ralph's bout with prostate cancer sparked the couple's decision to enter early retirement 16 years ago when he was 58 and Kathy just 52. They decided to live their dream of getting away from Massachusetts' cold, snowy and icy winters. They first moved to Zephryhills for five years before settling into an Over-55 community in Sarasota.

"Sarasota has everything we want – the arts, great dining, beach and sports," Kathy said. "And, the sun always shines - even behind the clouds. Up north it's a little depressing, gray and gloomy. I still like to hang my clothes outside and when you get up in the morning and the sun is shining, what is better?"

Kathy was a stay-at-home mom before entering the workforce as a Human Resource director once the children were grown. Ralph retired as a metalurgist. Careful planning and budgeting allowed them to retire early – a feat many today may never realize.

"Never live beyond your means because you can't always have everything you want," Kathy advises.

The couple give back by serving as disaster volunteers with the American Red Cross.

Their Over-55 community and its residents serve as an extended family. Neighbors routinely check in on each other and numerous activities are offered. Late spring and summer the couple will be traveling to see family and spend time in the family home before returning back to Sarasota and their winter nest – and baseball.

### 'Special Catch' at Sarasota's Barnacle Bill's

When traveling, I like to dine at locally owned restaurants, if possible.

After a busy day doing business in Sarasota I returned to my airport hotel tired and I hoped to find a decent place to eat.

But I was not alone on this trip. My 26-year-old nephew wanted seafood. Too tired to contemplate a trip to nearby beaches where seafood places are numerous, I asked our helpful front desk clerk if there was a good seafood restaurant nearby.

Her face lit up and she proudly proclaimed, "Barnacle Bill's!" And the best part?

It was just around the corner.

Located off the Tamiami Trail, the main drag in the region, Barnacle Bill's North is located in a non-descript suburban location with a lighthouse façade serving as a landmark. There is a second restaurant on Main Street in downtown Sarasota.

The north restaurant location recently was updated with new flooring, tables, chairs and equipment, lighter-colored décor and renovated restrooms.

It was easy to find and parking was plentiful when we arrived at 7:30 p.m. It seems the Early Bird Specials crowd had already arrived en masse and left. But a scattering of patrons in the dining room and a crowd at the bar made for a festive atmosphere.

The first thing you notice upon arrival is posters and other information on the source for the restaurant's famous Alaskan King Crab – boats from Dutch Harbor, Alaska, made famous in the popular reality show, The Deadliest Catch.

Owners Bill and Ken Davis are selective when purchasing seafood and they are proud to announce that to their patrons.

My nephew was hungry and not surprising chose the Seafood Platter, which featured generous portions of golden brown shrimp, scallops, fish and a crab cake served with side dishes of dirty rice and steamed vegetables at \$21.95.

I had eaten a late lunch and went for something lighter and one of my seafood favorite dishes – the Crab Cakes – this time served in a sandwich for \$9.95.

What I've discovered is that not all crab cakes are made the same. Some restaurants are overly generous with breading and less so with crab.

Not so with Barnacle Bill's. My crab cake was generous both in size and the crab was tasty and discernable. The sandwich was dressed with lettuce and tomato, with a pickle and French fries for side items.

After much contemplation, we decided to order one of the restaurant's homemade desserts – the Key West-style key lime pie. Tart with a light crust and paired with a fresh cup of coffee, it was the perfect end to a good meal.



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



How often can you enter a world of contented people, genuinely pleased to meet you?

A place where friendly dogs wander the streets or opt to nap in the middle of a sidewalk. A place where cats ignore you but nonetheless accept a gentle stroke or a verbal compliment.

No question about it. The moment you leave the highway and turn onto Cholokka Boulevard, park your car, step out and look around, you're hooked.

It's called love at first sight. And you're not alone in this newfound love.

Moviemakers through the years have discovered the tiny town of Micanopy (which covers approximately one square mile) as the perfect spot to film movies that appeal to all age groups.

Four successful movies using Micanopy as a background include Doc Holliday, with Michael J. Fox, Cross Creek, Miracle at Clemon's Pond and The Yearling.

The "Old Florida" town is the perfect blending of town and nature, reflecting a way of life lived more than a century ago. The historic brick buildings stand tall and proud among ancient oak trees laced with Spanish moss. Gardens of flowers and shrubs of every color and type imaginable ramble throughout the town, adorning yards, fences, buildings and trees.

Micanopy is the first distinct United States town in Florida with settlement that began after Spain ceded the Florida Territory in 1821. Historic Micanopy, as many residents call their town, was incorporated in 1889 and described as "a settlement of 600 people with schools, churches, hotels, stores, a grist mill and a cotton mill."

More than 100 years later little has changed, except for the explosion in population now numbering 650. Somehow Micanopy has managed to escape growth and industry, and kept its environment and rural way of life. And that's because the residents like it that way!

Micanopy, pronounced Mick ah no pee, with the accent on the 'no' boasts 38 brick and wood buildings that are on the National Register of Historic Places. These structures line Cholokka Boulevard, Micanopy's main street. All are filled with thriving businesses as diverse as a field of wild flowers - with eye-catching names such as Coffee & Cream, Dakota Mercantile and Delectable Collectables.

What began as a rural area, perfect in weather and soil for growing citrus trees, Micanopy, in order to survive after the frosts of the 1990s, became a tourist town. All along Cholokka Boulevard antique shops, galleries, boutiques, book stores and restaurants thrive.

Sharon Conchiglio, owner of the Dakota Mercantile has managed her shop for over 14 years. She offers "an assortment of goods for gracious living." Many of her items are imported from France including scented soaps, jewelry, and charming baby clothes

Monica Fowler of Delectable Collectables has owned her store for 30 plus years. She specializes in antique cameos, assorted collectables and jewelry, old and new. Fowler, as most shopkeepers in the town, always has her best friend with her – a big black cat, a mix of Maine Coon, Calico, and black and white tuxedo, named Abigail.

Maplewood Farms & Bake Shop is one of the newer stores, specializing in organic foods, homemade breads freshly baked in a brick oven each Saturday and Sunday, and a variety of eclectic items not found in the other stores. Guests are invited to sit on the front porch to enjoy a cup of organic coffee and a healthy, tasty pastry, while listening to Bluegrass music.

The Herlong Mansion Historic Inn & Gardens, dating back to 1845 is another listing on the National Register of Historic Places. Featured in National Geographic Magazine's "Must Stay Places You Will Love," the Herlong Mansion has garnered rave reviews, describing it as "Florida's Most Elegant Bed & Breakfast."

Shady Oak Studio teaches stained glass crafting "to guide you through a world of color and beauty limited only to your imagination." The Studio is also a showplace for visitors looking for that special gift, unique, personal, and extraordinary.

Although Micanopy has several restaurants in the area, only two are on the Boulevard: the Old Florida Café, and Coffee & Cream. Both offer soup, sandwiches, salads and desserts.

A "must visit" is the Micanopy Museum where a volunteer docent Jim Healy gives information about his hometown, be it serious, humorous, historic, or all three combined. Healy will tell you that Micanopy is located halfway between St. Augustine on the east coast and Cedar Key on the west coast. He smiles as he repeats the "legend of the lost lake." It seems that "once upon a time" a lake existed on the southeast part of town. One morning, the good citizens awoke to another day of swimming and fishing when, to their shock the lake was gone. Some people still scratch their heads wondering how and when and IF. Supposedly some homes still have piers heading toward the water!

Displays abound in the museum sharing information on Chief Micanopy of the Seminole Nation, after whom the town was named. The Civil War, turpentine and citrus industry exhibits are displayed. Clothes, tools, appliances and farm equipment of the early settlers show a life of hard work, setbacks, and a will to survive and move forward for the next generation.

For those looking for something a little different to discover and take advantage of while in Micanopy, a side trip to nearby Payne's Prairie Preserve State Park is minutes away. Heavy with greenery, the park is filled with all the natural beauty found in north central Florida. And "up the road apiece" is the Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings State Park where the visitor can take a tour through the "old Cracker-style" house where Rawlings lived for over 20 years. On the screened-in porch is the typewriter where she wrote her Pulitzer Prize winning novel, The Yearling.

Micanopy is well worth your time for a day, a weekend or longer. A rare find in today's hectic world, it is a place to experience peace and tranquility, with a touch of adventure. If your wish is to take a step back in time – **this is IT.**

"Dolphin Tale," an upcoming major motion picture centers on Winter, a real-life dolphin who was caught in a crab trap near Cape Canaveral and was unable to escape.

The three-month-old dolphin was rescued from that trap in Mosquito Lagoon and transported to the Clearwater Marine Aquarium, where she continued her fight for survival.

Winter lost her tail, but was fitted with a prosthetic device and was successfully rehabilitated. She now swims happily at the aquarium, where people from all over the globe come to visit her.

Winter's real-life story and a fictional story wrapped around it, are combined in the 3D movie which just finished filming in Clearwater.

Alcon Entertainment is producing the film that is expected to be released by Warner Bros. this fall.

The duo of Alcon Entertainment and Warner Bros. in recent years brought movie-goers "The Blind Side," starring Sandra Bullock and The Book of Eli, starring Denzel Washington.

"Dolphin Tale" stars Harry Connick, Jr., Morgan Freeman, Ashley Judd, Kris Kristofferson and last, but, of course, not least, Winter.

Connick plays the director of the center that rescues and rehabilitates Winter. Ashley

Judd plays the mother of Sawyer (Nathan Gamble) who befriends Winter and rallies others to help the dolphin. Freeman is a doctor from the Veterans Administration who creates a prosthetic tail for Winter. Kristofferson plays Connick's dad and lives with him and Connick's daughter on a houseboat at the marine hospital, according to various online and newspaper reports.

Much of the filming for the movie was done at Clearwater Marine Aquarium, which began talking with Alcon Entertainment about a movie deal back in Spring of 2007, according to a blog posted on the aquarium's website by the center's CEO David Yates.

Besides featuring the friendship between a boy and a dolphin, the film explores other themes – including courage – and the inspiring effect that Winter has on people who have been fitted with artificial limbs, according to published reports.



### Floridian lands role in Dolphin Tale

When Jim Fitzpatrick, of Seminole, heard that a major motion picture about the friendship between a boy and an injured dolphin was being filmed at nearby Clearwater Marine Aquarium, he wanted in.

Fitzpatrick, no stranger to movie sets, predicts that "Dolphin Tale" will become a true family classic.

"This is one of those relationship-type family films that will leave an indelible impression on everyone who sees it," Fitzpatrick said. "I really believe that this movie is going to touch a lot of people's hearts."

Fitzpatrick also thinks the film has all of the elements to make it a huge box-office success: the stars, the team making the film, the story and the 3-D format.

Alcon Entertainment shot much of the movie at the aquarium, but it also converted a big empty department store for a sound stage, Fitzpatrick said.

It also built a houseboat where some characters in the movie lived and a huge water tank – which is where Winter, the dolphin now resides. Winter, a dolphin who lost her tail in a crab trap, is at the center of the story.

Fitzpatrick plays the role of Max, an ex-marine who is the uncle of Sawyer (Nathan Gamble), a young outcast boy who befriends Winter.

The boy and the dolphin were good for each other, Fitzpatrick said.


"They were each other's support system. They became each other's family."

Fitzpatrick's character shares many scenes with Ashley Judd, who played the role of Sawyer's single mom.

Working with Judd was a pleasure, Fitzpatrick said.

He described her as a "total professional.

"She comes absolutely prepared and ready to work," he said. At the same time, she is "accessible and sweet."



"The very first day it was 97 degrees and the humidity, it felt like it was about 80 percent," Fitzpatrick said.

It was not exactly glamorous.

"November got really cold," he said, estimating it was in the high 20s on the coldest day on the set. There was a scene where he had to wear a summer shirt and shorts. "It was freezing." Fitzpatrick said.

Many work days lasted 12 hours, beginning around 6 or 6:30 in the morning.

There also were some technical challenges that needed to be worked out, since the movie was filmed in 3D.

Throughout the filming, the director and crew maintained a standard of excellence, Fitzgerald said.

"They were such perfectionists when it came to the script, to the actors, to the scenes," Fitzpatrick said. They brought out the best in everyone, he added.

When the actors saw a short sizzle reel, they were jazzed by the quality of the film and its emotional impact.

"It's extremely touching," the actor said. Fitzpatrick is no stranger to movies.

He first fell in love with them when he was just 5 years old.

He recalls the moment as if it were yesterday.

He had gone with his family to see "The Sound of Music" at Tampa Theatre in downtown Tampa. "I was totally enamored with the size and scope of the movie," he said.

He was in his first school play when he was 13 and since has gone on to play a multitude of roles in movies and television shows. He now owns has an independent film company.

Working on the "Dolphin Tale" was a fabulous experience, Fitzpatrick said.

"Everyone who was working this film brought their heart and soul to work."

#### **Visit Clearwater Marine Aquarium**

Florida's winter residents looking for a few bragging rights may want to drop by the Clearwater Marine Aquarium before heading home this year.

The aquarium was the setting for much of the filming of "Dolphin Tale," a major motion picture about a young boy who befriends a dolphin who has lost her tail in a crab trap and is fitted with a prosthetic flipper.

By visiting the aquarium now, winter residents will miss the rush that the aquarium staff expects when the 3D movie by Alcon Entertainment is distributed by Warner Bros. this fall

The story of Winter, who was named after the season when she was rescued, already has captivated audiences through coverage by the Today Show, The Bonnie Hunt Show, Animal Planet, Reader's Digest, USA Today, TIME magazine and countless other publications and television programs.

Such exposure already has motivated people from all over the globe to visit Winter, and when the movie spreads the dolphin's story to even more people – the aquarium expects to see even bigger crowds. It is even planning to add more parking to accommodate the increased traffic.

Krista Rosado, spokeswoman for the Clearwater Aquarium puts it like this: "We are expecting our attendance to rise dramatically. We expect to be very busy." She thinks the movie will have broad appeal.

"The movie is based on Winter's real story and the inspiration she provides to people who face difficulties, and for that reason the movie is touching," Rosado said.

Alcon Entertainment and Warner Bros. are the same duo that was behind "The Blindside," a critically acclaimed blockbuster that starred Sandra Bullock, who captured an Oscar for her performance.

"Dolphin Tale" also stars some heavyweights. Its cast includes Morgan Freeman, Harry Connick Jr., Ashley Judd, Kris Kristofferson and Nathan Gamble, the boy who befriends the injured dolphin.

Visitors to the aquarium will be able to see the 80,000-gallon tank built for the movie, which has become Winter's home. They also will be able to see a rustic, Old-Florida houseboat – complete with a crow's nest on top. The houseboat was also made for the movie but has become a permanent fixture at the aquarium. (Visitors are not allowed to board it at this point, but are expected to be able to in the future).

Being able to see those things are just a few of the aquarium's high points.

There also are dolphin shows, an otter exhibit, a turtle exhibit, shark feedings, a shipwreck alley, touch tanks and a stingray beach where visitors can touch and feed the rays.

The aquarium has a round theater where visitors can see how it does its rescue, rehabilitation and release work in a movie that include's Winter's story. There also are guided kayak and sea life safari boat tours available for additional charges.

The aquarium was closed to the public from mid-September to mid-December to accommodate filming of "Dolphin Tale." But even during that time, the aquarium's mission of caring for marine life carried on.

"We actually admitted oil-spill turtles during this time, so animal care was definitely not affected," Rosado said.

He sticks out his hand.

"Sir, thank you for your service. Welcome to the National World War II Museum."

That's the welcome every World War II – and any other veteran - receives when they enter the museum, located in downtown New Orleans.

The three-story building houses exhibits from an era often called "The Greatest Generation."

The museum is open seven days a week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., except on Thanksgiving Day, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day and, of course, Mardi Gras Day.

Which brings up an interesting question? Why New Orleans?

The city is home to the LCVP, or Higgins boat, the landing craft that brought thousands of U.S. soldiers to shore in every major amphibious assault of WWII. Andrew Jackson Higgins and the 30,000 Louisiana workers of Higgins Industries designed, built, and tested 20,000 Higgins boats in Southeastern Louisiana during the war. Dwight Eisenhower once claimed that Higgins was "the man who won the war for us."

One of the Higgins boat is prominently displayed in the Main Gallery.

The late Dr. Stephen Ambrose was the founder of the museum. He spent decades researching and writing about WWII, Eisenhower and D-Day. As he collected more than

2,000 oral histories from D-Day veterans, he realized that the United States had no museum to honor these men and women.

On the ground floor, some kiosks are manned by "real soldiers," who offer their experiences about the war equipment. One talks about a WWII jeep, while another offers insight on a howitzer.

The exhibitions blend personal accounts, artifacts, documents, photographs and film footage to tell the stories of the amphibious landings that made victory in World War II possible. It ranges from the beaches of Normandy to the sands of Iwo Jima.

Some can spend a few hours, while others could spend an entire day at the museum.

At the end of the war, there were 16 million veterans and now they are just under 2 million still alive. The museum is trying to collect oral histories of veterans, as well as artifacts. Check out the website at www. nationalww2museum.org for much more information.

Another part of the museum is across the street. It includes the Victory Theater, which shows "Beyond All Boundaries." It is an impressive 4-D experience, featuring Tom Hanks as the narrator and the voices of several wellknown actors.

It is a sensory experience with a 120-foot screen and special effects theatre seats, which allow visitors to share in the sounds and feelings of the story.

The Stage Door Canteen offers a pre-show dinner or brunch, followed by "Let Freedom Swing," a set of music from the 1940s among a musical production of singers and dancers. The shows are Friday and Saturday evenings





with a Sunday matinee.

And the American Sector by Chef John Besh is a restaurant that offers classic American cuisine. Check for times and reservations.

All WW II veterans who visit are encouraged to sign the Roll of Honor. Documentary films are shown daily in the Malcolm Forbes Theater on the half-hour from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Museum welcome guides are available in French, Spanish, German and Braille.

The museum offers lectures and tours for all ages, including school classes. The museum has a store and coffee shop.



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
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
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
