


"New adventure" brings northeastern couple to Pensacola Beach

Retired educators Kathi and Bill Cutler began their "new adventure" – retirement – in 2017. Bill (70) grew up in rural Massachusetts and Kathi (67), in rural Maine. They married in 1991.

The couple combined his two daughters from a previous marriage and three "heart" children (two girls and one boy) into their family. They spend seven and a half months each year in a long-term rental at Pensacola Beach, Fla.

They made their first visit to Pensacola Beach in 2010 to visit one of their daughters who had relocated there with five of the couple's 14 grandchildren. The couple attends and is active at Pensacola Beach Community Church.

They spend the other months visiting their other children and grandchildren in Kansas, Vermont, Minneapolis and Maine.



Q. What did you do before retirement?

Kathi worked for 42 years in public education, from elementary school through high school, serving as a music and choral instructor for 21 years, and then as an assistant principal and principal in high school and middle schools in Maine and Connecticut. Kathi retired in 2017 from her position as principal of a middle school in Orange, Conn.

Bill was in college ministry for 44 years, working with the InterVarsity Christian Fellowship at colleges and universities throughout New England, and retired from his work with graduate ministries on the Yale campus in 2017.



Q. Has the Novel Coronavirus changed your habits while on the coast? And if so, how?

Yes, the virus has impacted our lives here. One of our granddaughters was recently exposed to the virus at her dance studio, so we had to quarantine from her family, which meant not being able to have them with us for Thanksgiving though we brought over a box of food for them.

Q. What kind of activities do you each enjoy?


Kathi likes to cook and is very good. I like to eat what she makes, so this works out well! I (Bill) have been running regularly since 2017 when I participated with my daughter Cori in the Bridge-to-Bridge run. I like to swim in the Gulf and the condo pool. Kathi got me a paddleboard last Christmas, but I haven't quite the hang of standing on it yet! With the virus limiting our social life, we've gotten into jigsaw puzzles a lot and have an ongoing Scrabble tournament between ourselves. The three main activities with which Bill was involved were impacted by the virus.



I helped start up a local park run (www.parkrun.us), which began in February 2019. This is a free weekly 5K that happened every Saturday morning on the wooded trails at UWF until March 2020, when we had to cancel until large group events become safe again.

Last spring, Kathi had wanted to volunteer at a Pensacola hospital working with infants but had to put that on hold. She was also working as a substitute teacher at a local music school but had to stop that once the school stopped in-person lessons. Social times with friends or taking grandkids to movies, concerts, and other group activities all stopped.

The couple said they look forward to when the virus eases, and they can participate in in-person activities. But in the meantime, they are staying busy doing what they can where they can.





12 tips for better long-distance video chats

The COVID-19 pandemic fundamentally changed the way many of us communicated as we've had to isolate from family and friends.

Zoom has become the mainstay of communicating remotely, either through the computer or on your phone.

Here are some tips to make your Zoom experience better.

- Change your Zoom background to space, or a custom photo: Go to Settings > Virtual Background and select or upload the image you want from there.
- Mute and unmute with the space bar: Press and hold the spacebar to mute and unmute your mic.
- Set up a waiting room for added privacy: Zoombombing occurs when uninvited guests crash your Zoom meeting and disrupt it. Enable the Waiting Room feature, so you can see who's attempting to join the meeting before allowing them access. Go to Account Management > Account Settings. Click on Meeting, then click Waiting Room to enable the setting.
- Share your screen: Click on the Share screen icon on the toolbar at the bottom of the meeting screen. You'll have the option to share your entire desktop, or just one of the windows you have open.
- React with emoji on screen: If you're muted in a meeting, you can still let the hosts know your thoughts with emoji reactions. Send a thumbs up or a clapping emoji to communicate without

interrupting the meeting. To react during a meeting, click the Reactions tab at the bottom of the meeting screen.

- Turn on gallery view: Gallery view lets you see everyone in the meeting at once, instead of just the person speaking. Click the tab that says "Gallery view" in the top right corner.
- Record the meeting to your computer: Both free and paid Zoom subscribers can record their meeting to their laptop or computer using the desktop app Go to Settings > Recording and toggle it on. When you're hosting a Zoom meeting, click the Record icon on the bottom toolbar.
- Host a group meeting longer than 40 minutes: On Zoom's free basic tier, group meetings can only last up to 40 minutes (though one-on-one meetings are unlimited in time). To get unlimited group time, upgrade to a paid account.

Looking good in an online chat

Place the camera at face level or slightly higher for the most flattering angle. Looking down isn't flattering to anyone.



- Check your lighting to make sure you don't have harsh shadows. Having several sources of light will give a more diffused look.
- Choose a simple background. A lot of clutter is distrating during a video chat.
- Want a little extra "oopmph"? many programs have features that allow you to smooth lines and brighten your face for a healthy glow.

There are many video chat options, including Facetime and Skype. You may just want to check in with family and friends to see what services they are already using, then get on board. Plus, they'll be extra help if you get stuck!

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
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Running for health helps beat the pandemic blues

The year 2020 saw me running to get through it. Literally. Let me back up to January 2019. I had been contemplating adding light running to my exercise regime. At that point, I was a few years into a weight loss effort through which I have now lost about 150 pounds. As a relatively inactive person for most of my life, and now in my late 40s, I knew I needed some professional guidance, so I enrolled a "My First 5K" training program at Pensacola's Running Wild shoe store.

For the first 12 weeks of 2019, I met two nights a week with a team of coaches and other novice runners, building our strength, stamina and confidence. At the end of 12 weeks, we ran a 5K race on Pensacola Beach. My time wasn't good, but I ran the whole way without slowing to a walk, which was my only goal.

Running a 5K was probably the biggest physical accomplishment this life-long fat kid ever achieved. I love it. Not just the races, but I have kept running several times a week. I went on to run in about 10 more 5Ks in the year following that first race. I loved it! I saw neighborhoods, parks and facilities I had never seen (or at least noticed) before. The crowds of runners, all having fun and yet working toward a goal, electrifies me. After I run for 10 or 15 minutes, that "runner's high" people talk about really sets in. If you are lucky enough to find a buddy running at your pace, you can chat as you run, which is all the better.

I welcomed 2020 looking forward to a year of running adventures. Then, about a week after the exuberant McGuire's St. Patrick's Day Prediction 5K in March, COVID-19 hit. Sports events – including 5Ks – were necessarily halted.

I was one of the lucky ones. My employer sent me home to



work. That fact, and that no one in my closest circles has fallen to the virus, are things I am sincerely grateful for. All through quarantine, I have continued to run. Science says running creates feel-good endorphins in our brains. The pandemic – not to mention Hurricane Sally – caused extra stress, worry, financial insecurity, loneliness and cabin fever for me and, I'd bet, most people. Thank God for those extra endorphins!

Running a half hour in my neighborhood, two or three times a week, helps clear my head. My body needs to expend that energy, stretch those muscles and sweat out those toxins. Running can be an emotional, almost spiritual, cleansing for me. In a time of isolation, running has also led me to develop deeper friendships with fellow runners.


As understanding of the virus and the development of proper precautions have evolved, some of the organized 5K races have returned. My first race back was Pensacola Half Marathon & 5K in October. Registrations were limited, people wore masks when they weren't running and they spaced runners several feet apart at the starting line to help create natural breaks. I asked my personal physician if he felt like 5K races, like most outdoor events, were safe, and he agreed they were.

Running – planning my runs and races, the relationships I share through running and the benefits of maintaining my weight – salvaged 2020 as best for me as could have been hoped for. So, in addition to my job and my healthy family, I am adding running to my 2020 gratitude list.

It seems like a hundred years ago. But it was only last year. I can't forget it. There I am, at a restaurant. I am playing Christmas music on an accordion with a band. There is no virus, no social distancing, and everyone is happy. I am out and about in public. What a notion.

I play accordion because my granddaddy played it before me. This instrument is in my lineage. And it's in our history as a civilized race. Thus, I believe that as long as we have young accordionists, there is still hope for humanity.

A few children approach our stage.

"WHAT KIND OF INSTRUMENT IS THAT?" asks the redhead.

"It's an accordion," I say.

"WOW! IT'S SO HUGE AND DORKY LOOKING!"

"That's not very nice..."

"IT SOUNDS LIKE A DYING TOAD!"

"NO," says another. "IT SOUNDS LIKE AN ANIMAL GETTING RUN OVER BY A CAR!"

"Hey kid," I say. "Santa told me you're getting nothing but underwear and deodorant this year."

This kind of accordion shaming is nothing new. I've been ridiculed since my childhood. I have heard all the classic jokes.

Such as: What do you call a successful accordionist? A guy whose wife has two jobs.

Or: What are the first words an accordionist says after he knocks on your door? "Pizza delivery."

But I don't care. When I play accordion, I play for my mother's father—the man who fought in Europe, and won a Purple Heart for his valiance. He was a farmer, a storyteller, a wood carver, a musician who could sing in Italian, German, French, Spanish, and Cajun. And when he played "Lady of Spain," it was magic.

Of course all this accordion business can be embarrassing to admit at, say, dinner parties. Like a party I was at a few years ago. The attorney sipping gin remarked: "I'm learning guitar, I got one for my birthday this year."

"Yeah," added the thoracic surgeon. "I played a little saxophone in high-school band."

"Well," I said. "I play the accordion."

They laughed softly. Then, one man handed me his glass and said, "I'll take a refill on this gin."

No. People prefer guitarists. A guitarist can walk into a crowded party and females will hurl themselves at him.

An accordionist walks into a room, and suddenly a snowbird named Ethel is attached to his arm, talking about her grandkids in Sheboygan.

Even so, I am what I am. I started playing accordion because my family was funadamentaliat, and every Saturday night from my infancy we watched what all evangelicals watched. "The Lawrence Welk Show."

Admittedly, I'm not a huge fan of any show that features 38 guys who all look like your father's dentist, singing for an hour about Hawaii. But there was, however, one thing I liked.

Myron Floren. The gentle Dakotan would appear on the screen, wearing a 120-bass PANaccordion, and I would almost mess my britches. He would play "Tico Tico" at a lightning fast tempo. His hair was greased with industrial cement, his teeth were porcelain, he was a god.

One Christmas, my parents got me a small 12-bass accordion. I would lock myself in my bedroom and practice "La Valse de la Belle" for hours.

Then, I would apply an entire can of my father's pomade before going to baseball practice.

When I became a better accordionist, I entered the fourth-grade talent show. I played "Cajun Surprise." followed by "Louisiana Joe." I played superbly.

I expected applause. Or at the very least, a key to the city. But when I finished, the audience made no noise.

A man in the front row mumbled, "What's all that sticky junk in your hair?"

I almost gave up the instrument for good. But my granddaddy told me that I couldn't.

"If you don't play the accordion," he said. "Then pretty soon mankind won't have any accordions left. The world is depending on you, son."

So with that kind of responsibility on my shoulders I started taking gigs. My first professional gig was a funeral. I was 14. They paid me 10 bucks. I'll never forget it.

It was a Pentecostal service. The preacher asked me to play something mournful. So, I played "Peace in the Valley."

One woman started crying, then another. And when the preacher's baritone voice began singing with me, I almost forgot which song I was playing.

Since then, I have played my accordion for all kinds of occasions. Caiun soirées, country dances, beer festivals, Polka parties, quinciñeras, weddings, funerals, and one used car auction. And I have met interesting people along the way.

Like the 9-year-old boy that day I was telling you about, when playing with my band, who visited the restaurant stage while I was squeezing out "Jumbalaya."

"Hey, I like your accordion," he said. "It looks really old."

"I play accordion, too," the kid explained.

And I couldn't believe what I was hearing. "Will you play something for me?" I asked.


He agreed. I removed the instrument and handed it to him. The accordion was almost as big as he was. He strapped it to his chest and played a melody so sweet it made my heart hurt. He got a standing ovation—which almost never happens to accordionists.

"Where'd you learn to do that?" I asked.

"My grandpa taught me," he said.

Even in these troubled times there's still hope for the human race.
