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



Social distancing from a Minnesota winter

Nancy and Jeff Poferl weren't going to let a pandemic keep them from making their annual trek to their winter home in Gulf Shores, Ala.

Nancy, 65, and Jeff, 68, retired from their jobs and made their dream of leaving the cold, snowy Minnesota winters behind some nine years ago. Nancy worked in accounting and Jeff as an account manager.

The pair were among the youngest in the Minnesota Snowbird Club when they joined in the early years. They have two grown sons (Mike, 35, and Dan, 31) but no grandchildren (yet).

They spend the winter at their four-bedroom rental home located a few blocks back from the beach, located near The Hangout.

Their usual winter club activities are curtailed but they stay busy walking their quiet neighborhood and playing golf at the Gulf Shores Golf Club.

Here's their story:

Do you have any pets?

We have two Westies (Chip, age 13.5) and Princess Leia (5).

Was it hard to find a pet-friendly rental? VRBO was our best source, however property changes frequently and we need to look every two years or so.

How many years have you been coming to the Alabama Gulf Coast? This is our ninth year.

How long do you stay and do you visit other attractions?

We generally are gone by 15th of March. Usually three days of traveling and two nights lodging. Last year took a side trip to New Orleans and went to the World War II Museum.

When and how did you discover the Minnesota Snowbird Club?

Approximately eight years ago by word of mouth at the dog park.

Did you consider not coming back this winter?

We briefly thought about not coming, and seconds later determined we were coming, since we love to be outside golfing and walking, which are COVID / CDC-approved activities. We did have to consider damage to the property we rented since it was severely damaged by



Hurricane Sally. We stayed in touch with the owner who was on top of reconstruction/repairs.

Tell us a little about the club including activities and involvement.

The club usually meets for breakfast weekly and connects people to play cards, volunteer, etc. Nancy began volunteering seven years ago to manage the website and then became president about five years ago.

How are you staying in touch with members?

We are doing virtual meetings every other Tuesday at 10 a.m. via Zoom and include snowbirds here and those still at home. Other members are doing virtual card games, even some who are not coming down this year.

What do you miss most about the club not meeting in person?

Interaction with all of our members.

Any advice you want to give current or aspiring Snowbirds?

Fit your passions with the area you want to enjoy. Get recommendations from fellow snowbirds from your state, and research the internet and Facebook for forums to get this info, like the snowbird club websites and Facebook pages. We talked with fellow golfers when we were beginning our search of a place to winter and got many recommendations. Gulf Shores seemed the right fit for us. It is our home away from home now!

Do you ever consider moving?

It's a treat for us to be down there in winter but we are always happy to get home.

Hurricane Sally, a powerful Category 2 storm, delivered a blow to the tiny Perdido Key, Fla., community.

The storm made landfall on Sept. 16 on the nearby Alabama Gulf Coast, packing 105 mph winds. Perdido Key has been in steady recovery since the storm, with many lodging units under renovation. Already reeling from the Covid-19 pandemic, Perdido Key faced an uphill battle.

"Recovery has been a fairly smooth process considering the level of damage experienced here in the Perdido Area,"



said Dana Pagador, Perdido Chamber's executive director. "As with most natural disasters, the initial response is the most significant factor when bringing a community and it's businesses back online and running swiftly.

"Being on the outer edges of Escambia County and not technically Baldwin County, our community can be easily overlooked," she said. "Both counties have put forth a great effort to be sure Perdido Area was well included in both recovery processes."




Hurricanes Ivan and Dennis destroyed the existing pier in 2004 and 2005 pier and after five years of hard work, the new pier made its debut June 5, 2010.

Fun facts:

- An octagonal end design with a surface area of approximately 3,800 square feet
- Deck: Over 800 breakaway wood panels, which will detach during heavy wave action and help preserve integrity of the structure, reducing possible storm repair costs.

Sometimes it takes the prospect of losing something to appreciate what you have.


Such is the case when hurricanes threaten the Gulf Islands National Seashore. The top 10-rated national park opened 50 years ago after a vigorous campaign led by community leaders and the megaphone of the late Pensacola Journal editorial page editor and cartoonist J. Earle Bowden, who came to be known as the Father of the National Seashore.. The Gulf Islands encompasses a swath of Santa Rosa Island but also areas and islands from Destin, Florida to Cat Island, Mississippi.

Hurricane Sally delivered a \$4.5 million punch in September to the Florida area. The Mississippi area also sustained damage from Hurricane Zeta which landed in October. The Fort Pickens area, including the campground reopened in December. The Davis Bayou portion and its campground area near Ocean Springs, Miss., reopened in November.

The scenic drive along the J. Earle Bowden area of Santa Rosa County state road 399 has yet to reopen. Also, the Langdon Beach area of Fort Pickens (has covered picnic area and bathrooms) and Ship Island in Mississippi are still closed.

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
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The Great Bay

The world is a dang mess. And I have gone fishing. It's been a long time since I've held a rod in my hands. Too long. In fact, I can't remember the last time I sat on this overturned five-gallon bucket, perched upon the shore of this Choctawhatchee Bay, staring at this water.

Some people don't understand fishing. Take my wife. She can't figure out why any rational man would spend hours on a bucket not talking. She says it's boring.

Boring? No. To go fishing is to embark upon a great intellectual competition, attempting to outsmart the cleverest creature on earth. You might not think fish are intelligent, but believe me, they are much smarter than humans.

A redfish, for instance, would never drain his kid's college fund to purchase a 17-foot Tracker Pro Team 175 TXW boat package simply to go catch his limit of humans.

Today I came to this bay because earlier I was watching the news and it made me sick to my stomach. The headlines du jour were giving me literal palpitations. The irony is that I was having a pretty good day until I saw the state of our world. You have to worry about us sometimes.

So I packed my tackle and left. And I'm glad I did because bay water can work wonders on a man's soul.

Try to visualize this. I am looking at 129 square miles of brackish, blue water that spans two counties, and has a watershed that covers roughly 3,339,632 acres. Out here there are no radios, no screens, no phones. No traffic. No billboards. I only have a rod, a bucket, and the ghosts of my ancestors.

Fishing.


I come from a long line of fishermen. Most were mediocre anglers, but others were gifted like my uncle Ray Ray. Uncle Ray Ray could communicate with fish through extra sensory techniques. Sadly, the only message he could send was: "Don't come near me." His gift, I'm told, also worked on the ladies.

My grandfather was also an avid line-wetter. The rod I'm holding was his. It dates back to 1933. The old man would have purchased this fishing pole at age 22 via a mail-order catalog for \$6. These rods came with cheap reels, cork handles, and a guarantee to "last a lifetime." This one has lasted 88 years, which is pretty close.

The major selling point was that this rod is all steel, and can be disassembled to be carried in a small canvas bag. Thus it could be used on lunch breaks, before hot dates, after church service, or during. A young man like my grandfather would have assembled this rod and retreated to the water's edge for some meditation. Which is all fishing is. It's meditation with an occasional beer.

Although I'm not having any luck meditating today. It's January. This bay is chilly from brisk northerly gusts that bounce off the still water and numb my nose like frozen hamburger.

Which brings up an important point. The common



nicknamed Florida the "Sunshine State."

But the truth is our state should be called the "Overcast State."

Florida has more days per year in which the sun is blocked by 20 to 70 percent cloud coverage. That's more than any state in the continental U.S. But you don't print something like that on tourism brochures, or else tourists will start visiting Nevada to see Celine Dion.

Neither should you advertise that Florida that has more lightning strikes than any other state. Nor should you brag about having the most cases of fatal snakebites. And you definitely shouldn't tell tourists that Florida leads the league in rainfall. Oh, do we get rain. To give you an idea just how much: Seattle gets a whopping 38 inches of rain each year. Florida gets 54.

But today isn't about weather, nor about fishing. Not really. It was that I had to leave the house. I needed to breathe. To think. To be away from headline news. I came to the bay of my youth to forget that the world is angry right now.

This is the same tranquil water where Creek natives once fished for their livelihood. Where beautiful black-haired maidens once dove for blue crabs and oysters. Where young men caught mullet with handwoven nets.

This is also the same water where Spanish explorers like Ponce de León moored massive square-rigged ships in the 1500s, searching for a fabled Fountain of Youth that would make his eyes less droopy and his buns firmer.

Personally, I've often wondered if this bay isn't the fountain Ponce was looking for. After all, this bay has outlasted everyone and everything.

This ancient land withstood hurricanes that altered its shoreline. This place has endured colonization. It has somehow remained sturdy despite Revolutions, Civil Wars, yellow fever, Great Depressions, industrializations, World Wars, urban sprawls, and the cancer of tourism. And this water will outlast me, too. If that's not eternal youth, what is?



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




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Get inspired by Dauphin Island: Nature, dining & fun
