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

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Retired educators help lead resurgence of Destin Snowbirds Club

Back in the 1940s, Destin was a true fishing village and among those early arrivals was Ted Spring's aunt. She then played host to Ted's family in 1962 who made an early decision that he would one day live in the scenic little town.

Ted and his wife, Andrea were career educators making eight moves as they "climbed the ladder" at colleges, including Ted's two stints as



president.

They both were leaders in their own right and it's not surprising that the duo were tapped for leadership positions in the 900+ member Destin Snowbird Club.

Learn their story here:

Q. Where did you grow up? We grew up in upstate New York. We have a married daughter and a married son, whose families currently live in Florida, along with four granddaughters and one grandson, ages 5 to 14.

Q. How did you meet and how long have you been married?

We have been married for 51 years. We met at Bowling Green State University, where we were graduate teaching assistants earning master's degrees, hers in English, mine in business education. After graduation, Andrea taught middle and high school English, and I taught business at Alfred State College for several years. After I earned my Ph.D. at the University of Maryland, Andrea taught English and management communication courses at the college level over the next 25 years, while I held the positions of Director of Education, Dean of the College, Vice President for Academic Affairs, Executive Vice President in Maine, New York, Alabama, Georgia and Minnesota, and president at colleges in West Virginia and North Carolina.

Q. Where did you move from? We retired from North Carolina to Navarre while our Destin home was being built. It was completed in 2018.

Q. Why did you choose Destin? I has been in love with Destin since the early 1960s when I visited his aunt, who wintered here. When I brought Andrea to Destin in 1972, she too fell in love with its pristine beauty. We visited Destin whenever we could over the years, sharing its magic first with friends, then with our children, always planning to retire in Destin someday.

Q. How did you get involved with the Destin Snowbird club? Andrea and I visited one of the snowbird meetings. After the meeting, someone stopped me and said, "You'd make a great Vice President of the Club." The next thing I knew, I was being recruited and interviewed by Dean and Deb Harper. I was excited and pleased about being considered.

Q. What Snowbird activities do you enjoy?

Generally, we especially like the events with live music and opportunities to build and enjoy camaraderie, such as the harbor cruises, TGITs, Valentine Dance, the weekly meetings and get-togethers with other snowbirds at one of the many great eating places for breakfast, lunch or happy hours.

Q. What other activities do you enjoy?

We like to do things and go places with our kids and grandkids and help them out when we can. Our common interest in family history/ genealogy has fueled our desire to learn more about American history and also that of other countries and



cultures. We were excited to find out that our ancestors fought in the American Revolution and that some of them were here in the 1620s. We love traveling and experiencing other cultures.

Q. What roles have you had with the club?

Andrea mainly works on the prize committee and helps with registration. I have served as the 2nd and 1st Vice President, President, and Immediate-Past President, and now head up Publicity.

Q. What are the benefits of volunteering?

By volunteering, you get to meet more Snowbirds and get to know them as you work together to make the Club successful.

Q. Are you full timers or prefer a long-term stay?

We moved to Destin in 2018 and are year-round residents.

Q. Were you in Destin during the pandemic? How did the club fare? Yes, we were in Destin. The club canceled its season, but the board continued to work via Zoom to ensure a smooth start-up for the next year. Similar to other snowbird clubs, our membership numbers are still recovering from the pandemic; however, our memberships continue to increase.

Q. The space the club occupies in winter is known as 'The Roost." Do you know how it got that name? In 1997-1998, Harry Wagner, a snowbird member, was asked by then President Addie Selid to compile a history of the club. The history records of the club date back to 1973-74 when Ivan "Red" Lyons and his wife, Virginia, spent their first winter of retirement in Destin. In the records, I found this first reference to "The Roost" in a document written in the by Harry Wagner: "The first "Snowbird Roost" was at Shoreline Gardens Recreation Room in 1983-84." During the earlier days of the club. multiple sites accommodated the growing membership. As the sites changed, "The Roost" continued to be used to describe each location. It's interesting to note, the first meetings began in 1973-74 when the club was named "The Snowbird Mockingbird Club."

Q. How many members do you have this season?

We continue to add members at our weekly registrations and daily through online registration. Online registration has been successful; however, many people still prefer to register face-toface. They enjoy seeing friends and having a chance to catch up. To date, we have registered 749 members; 89 members are from Canada and one is from the United Kingdom. The largest numbers of members are from Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. Members can register from now through Feb. 12.

Q. The club continues to add activities - have any surprised you? No, not really. Our members are always ready for a good time, and the old and the new activities provided by the club keep them entertained. Our golf activities are a big draw, along with our Ladies Luncheon, our Harbor Cruises and our newest event, the Todd Herendeen Dinner bus trip to Panama City.

Q. Have club members dropped off because of cost of rentals, etc.? That's a great question. Right now, membership appears to be strong even though I have heard comments about growing concerns over price increases. Who knows what the future will bring. We do appreciate the businesses that support our club by giving door prizes to our members. We list their websites on ours and encourage members to patronize those businesses. We also announce names of vendors attending our meetings. It's a great way to market local businesses.

Q. Any idea the average age of your new members?

No. We don't ask. Who cares? You know, folks say that being 70 is the new 50 and so on. Our members are very active.

Q. Is there anything I haven't asked that you would like to mention? We would like to encourage members to get involved in the organization. There are plenty of opportunities to help from greeting people at meetings, helping with the prize committee, selling tickets, becoming a Board member, and many more. Talk with one of our Board members about becoming involved. The Springs say it's worth your time and effort!

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





These make up the Gulf Coast Kiln Walk, a vision created by Brenda, Marty and Jason Stokes, co-owners of Holley Hill Pottery. Over 2500 people participate in three weeks of activities leading up to the WoodStoke Festival. They include dedicated artists, Gulf Coast residents and annual tourists! The Anagama is loaded from back to front, in Japanese tradition, and takes four days to load 800 pieces. Six to 12 people must constantly monitor the kiln for 24 hours per day for six days. Every pot is strategically placed in this delicate process. Chris Gustin will bring his expertise to this process, along with Jason Stokes and the many potters who have worked this firing over the last 20 years. 

Libraries continue Trivia Night Tradition

Snowbirds will be swapping their smart phones for their thinking caps at the upcoming Snowbirds Trivia Night, set for Feb. 17, at the Orange Beach, Ala., Event Center.

Trivia Night is a two-decadesold tradition in South Baldwin County, having drawn as many as 600 participants in pre-pandemic years. Attendance has been about 150-players for the last two years.

"We are in the process of building back the crowds because it is such a fun night for everyone," said Susan Bartholomew, communications supervisor for the South Baldwin Literacy Council, which coordinates the event along with the Friends of the Orange Beach Library.



"We were excited to see 500 members at the Wisconsin club (recently) so we are hoping numbers will grow."

Snowbird Trivia Night in South Baldwin goes back to the early 2000s when it was founded by Missouri snowbirds Dale and Judy Collier. Mrs. Collier has since passed away, and Mr. Collier no longer travels south for winter, so the Literacy Council and Friends of the Library took over the effort two years ago.

Tickets are \$160 per eight-person table, although individual tickets are available. Each table is invited to decorate with a theme.

"The people who purchase the tables get together and decide on a theme for their table such as 'Under The



Sea,' 'The Roaring 20's,' Mardi Gras ... They decorate their table and some will even wear costumes to enhance the look," Bartholomew said. "We give gift cards from local businesses and beautiful 3D medals as prizes."

Typically, an evening consists of eight rounds of trivia, with categories like sports, movies, political science/ history, geography and entertainment.

Players will also have the opportunity to buy raffle tickets to win a "Pick-A-Pot," which are gift baskets compiled by various clubs using their home states as a theme. Players will also be allowed to purchase \$20 "Mulligans" to earn a pass on hard trivia questions as assistive devices such as cell phones and iPads are not allowed.

Proceeds benefit the South Baldwin Literacy Council and the Friends of the Orange Beach Library.

Snowbirds have special relationships with Gulf Coast libraries. At the Destin

Library, 107 snowbirds so far this year have paid the \$30 fee for to have a library card.

"For some, we are their first stop once they arrive in town,"

said Amy

C. Adams, library assistant at the Destin Library. "For patrons who don't get a card, we always have carts full of free books for them to take and books for purchase, which benefit our Friends Guild. Many snowbirds come in to check their email or browse the internet on our public computers or bring their devices to access our free Wi-Fi."

In Santa Rosa County, which includes libraries in Gulf Breeze (the closest library to Pensacola Beach) and Navarre, more than 350 snowbirds are registered as library patrons.

Jimmy Buffett's death last year was a shock to those along the Gulf Coast who loved the songs, albums and books the famed singer provided since the 1970s.

Much of it was because of the connection Buffett had in this area. Born in Pascagoula, Mississippi, he was raised in Mobile, Alabama, and performed many concerts along the Gulf Coast over the years. His sister runs Lulu's Restaurant, both in Destin and Gulf Shores.

When he passed away Sept. 1 at the age of 76 from an aggressive form of skin cancer, tributes poured in by the thousands. Many posted on their Facebook pages, their favorite song or memory that Buffett inspired.

Many of them involved songs like "Little Miss Magic" sung to pregnant moms or at a daughter's wedding.

Shortly after his passing, Mary Cracchiolo, marketing director at the Beau Rivage Casino in Biloxi, Mississippi, drove around the area, taking photos of his connection in the area -- his childhood home, Buffett Bridge, Buffett Beach in Pascagoula – and shared them on her social media channels.

"I was very heartbroken," she said. "I cried all weekend. It was like the end of an era and we all felt it was so fitting Jimmy would pass at the end of summer."

Spain became a Buffett fan shortly after college when she made regular trips to Key West and learned more about how he changed the area.

"What appealed to me was his songwriting and his storytelling," she said. "It's really incredible."

Over the years, she saw Buffett in

concert many times, including JazzFest in New Orleans and other intimate settings.

When asked what her favorite Jimmy Buffet song is, she can't pinpoint just one. "It depends on my mood. So many of his words resonate with me."

She is an active member of the Towns Around Biloxi Parrot Head Club.

"I just love Jimmy," she said. "He had a lifestyle we wish we all had."

There are Parrot Head clubs all along the Gulf Coast.

Pat Mudd, president of the Panama City Parrot Head Club, said he became a Jimmy Buffett fan 25 years ago when he saw the entertainer perform on Broadway at the opening of a Margaritaville play.

At the next meeting after Buffett's death, the club members did a video tribute.

"We had musicians play a lot of his songs," Mudd said. "I told my story; others who had seen him or had deep









relationships told their stories. It was a somber night."

Over the last couple of years, the Panama City Parrot Head Club has grown from 200 to 500 members. At their twicea-month meetings, local musicians come in to play and they

have raffles for local charities. They raise between \$1,600-2000 at each meeting.

Their big fundraiser is Rendezvous 2024, scheduled for April 18-21. The music festival brings in bands across the country and has raised \$140,000 for charity each year.

They also participate in Mardi Gras parades, a Pirate festival in the fall



and beach and highway cleanups. "Our motto is party with a purpose."

Mudd, whose favorite Jimmy Buffett song is "A Pirates Looks at 40," said Parrot Head clubs will continue despite his passing.

"He would have wanted these clubs to continue," Mudd said. "It's not about him, but about charities and a lifestyle."

Buffett fan in Mississippi had special connection to late singer

By day, Matt Hoggatt is employed by the Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College where he serves as the head instructor and program coordinator

criminal justice program. By night, he performs at various nightclubs.

To say he is a big Jimmy Buffett fan is almost an understatement. Buffett passed away in September last year.

In 2012, Hoggatt won the American Songwriter Lyric Contest for his song, "Dear Jimmy Buffett" in which his lyrics include a section where he tells Buffett that he "could sure use a record deal this year."

Hoggatt, who has performed in clubs all over the U.S., then posted the song on his website, www. matthoggatt.com. Shortly after that, someone from Buffett's organization called him and asked if he'd come to Birmgingham, Ala., and sing the song backstage to Buffett before his concert that night in front of 14,000 fans.

Buffett then surprised Hoggatt by playing a response song, "Dear Matt Hoggatt," then invited him up on stage that night to perform in front of the crowd.

He shared his thoughts about Buffett and the loss all Buffett fans felt when after he died.

Q. When/how did Jimmy Buffett first influence you?

My parents were schoolteachers, so every summer we would take a road trip somewhere. My parents had Jimmy's Changes in Latitudes album on cassette tape, and we would listen to it regularly on the long drives. The song "Biloxi" made me resonate with Jimmy because I was from the same area of the Gulf



for the

Coast. I ended up taking a deep dive into everything I could learn about Jimmy Buffett as a child.

Q. What do you think is the reason why Jimmy has captured the hearts/minds of so many "Parrotheads?"

I think it's because all of us are dreamers deep down inside, and Jimmy Buffett helped us realize that it's not only OK to dream, but it's something we should do on a daily basis. His music also crossed boundaries and invited people of all kinds of backgrounds to be part of the experience.

Q. What was your reaction in September when you heard he had passed?

I didn't know for certain he was gravely ill at the time, but I had a feeling he was dealing with something serious. When I woke up that morning, I got the word as soon as I picked up the phone and saw all of my messages. I turned on radio Margaritaville and spent the rest of the day just reflecting and trying to cope. Part of what helped me cope with his passing, was reading all of the stories people shared about Jimmy on social media. He touched the world and made it better.

Q. What is your favorite Jimmy Buffett song? And why?

I used to say a Pirate Looks at 40, but over the years I can't really pick a single favorite song anymore. They all have different meanings and invoke such different feelings for me, especially now.





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Don't let cold weather lead to injury during workout

Winter weather may not mean the same thing on the Gulf Coast as it does in Wisconsin, but between January and April, temperatures around freezing are not out of the question. Exercising in weather like that does come with a certain risk of injury. "Naturally, the body isn't as agile or flexible in freezing, or near freezing temperatures, as it is when it's not as cold," said Jim Presley, M.D., a non-surgical sports medicine specialist at Andrews Institute for Orthopaedics and Sports Medicine. "Working out in that type of weather can lead to injury unless proper precautions are taken." Know Before You Go

But, the cold weather doesn't mean you need to put your workout on hold until the temps come up. There are ways to minimize the risk. At the top of the list is to know the forecast. If you are planning an outdoor workout that day or the next, check the local forecast to make sure the weather is conducive to exercising. An outdoor temperature of 35 degrees Fahrenheit with strong winds may produce a wind chill factor in the teens or lower. Unless you have workout gear that covers most of the body, including extremities like your fingers, ears and nose, exercising indoors may be a better idea in those conditions.

Be Ready to Adapt

Dressing in layers is another important thing to remember. Exercising can heat you up quickly, despite the actual cold air. That leads to sweating which takes heat away from your body and you may feel chilly. Wearing several layers allows you to remove and add clothing, depending on how you are feeling. A base layer of a synthetic fiber can wick moisture away from the body and help regulate your body temperature.

A significant wind can exacerbate this issue in the winter, which leads to another tip. Whenever possible, head into the wind to start the workout so you're not dealing with the worst of the wind chill during the second half of the workout when you're more fatigued and perspiring.



Hydration Is Key

Colder air is often drier air and that means your skin and clothes may dry out easier. Dry clothes and colder temperatures may make you feel like you aren't sweating and don't need to take in water, but this can lead to dehydration, especially during prolonged exercise outdoors. Using moisturizer or lotion and drinking plenty of water is a great way to make sure that doesn't happen to you.

Warm Up and Cool Down, Even When It's Cold

A longer warm up may be necessary in colder temperatures to improve blood flow to muscles and prepare them for a hard workout. Exercising hard when muscles are cold and tight can lead to a new injury or worsen an existing one. A slow warm up can go a long way in keeping you healthy.

Once the workout is over, it is extremely important to cool down.

"Stopping a workout abruptly in cold temperatures will allow rapid cooling of muscles and can lead to stiffness and soreness which may, in turn, lead to injury. A light jog or walk right after a hard run, or a slow bike ride for a few minutes after a long, fast one helps remove toxins from muscle tissue, leading to a quicker recovery, leaving you feeling less stiff and sore," Presley said.

Winter weather workouts on the Gulf Coast may not be as

treacherous as they are up north, but ignoring these simple tips may still lead to injury.

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
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
